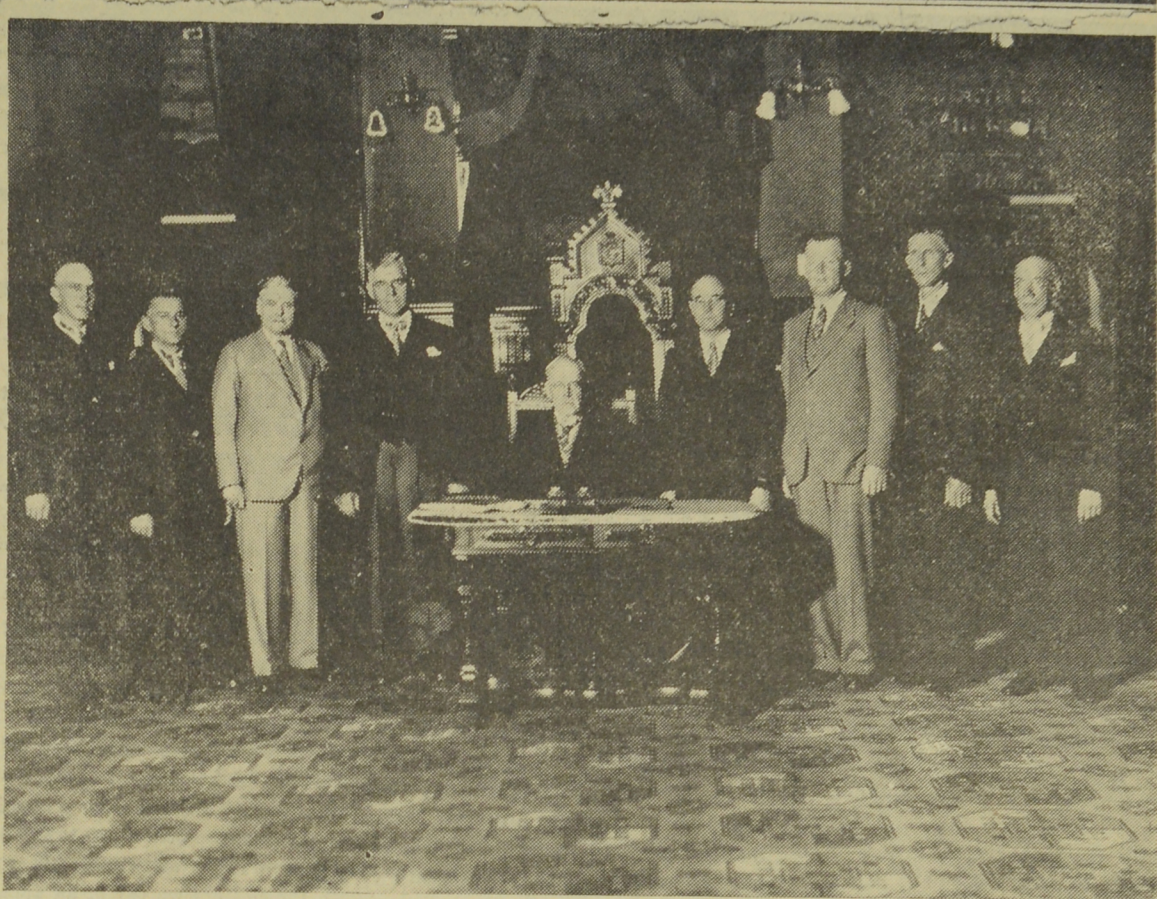

POLITICAL  
LIBEL ACTION  
SETTLED

London, July 17. — A political libel action against young Randolph Churchill and the editor and publishers of a London weekly newspaper was settled today.

Sir Thomas White, prominent Liverpool Conservative, had instituted proceedings after publication of an offending article, contributed by the son of the noted Diehard.

At the time the article was written Randolph Churchill was making an unsuccessful bye-election fight in Wavertree, Liverpool. Defendants agreed to pay \$5,000 and costs of proceedings, while counsel for Churchill expressed the latter's apology for the injury he had caused Sir Thomas.

The article made gossiping allegations of a deal in "municipal honor" and plaintiff's counsel denied there was a word of truth in any of the statements.

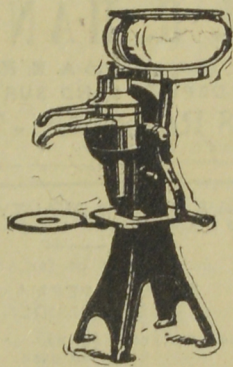
