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CANADA IN THE HANDS OF THE PEOPLE

Six Million People Have Say as to Who Will Rule in Canada

Bennett, King and Stevens Will Hear Returns at Ottawa Tonight— Conservative and Inde- pendent Withdraw at Montreal.

Across Canada electors are going to the polls today. Fine weather should have the effect of bringing out a large vote. It is the biggest election that Canada ever saw, considering the number of parties and number of candidates.

There are four national parties and many independent party labels such as Social Credit, Communists and it runs right down the line to a Technician, an Anti-Communist and a man in Verdun, Que., running as a Verdun candidate. Fifteen women are appealing for public confidence, including Agnes Macphail, the only woman ever elected to the Canadian House.

Three national leaders will watch the national polling from Ottawa—Prime Minister Bennett, Liberal Leader Mackenzie King and Reconstruction Leader Stevens. The fourth, J. S. Woodsworth, leader of the C.C.F., is in Winnipeg, his home city. The first three have completed coast-to-coast tours and with Mr. Woodsworth have aggregated 45,000 miles.

The polls opened at eight o'clock this morning and will close at six o'clock this evening. Long after our local returns are in this evening the electors of British Columbia and Alberta will still be voting owing to the difference in our time and of that in far western Canada. It is probable that the electors in British Columbia will hear the result of the Maritime province vote before their polls close out there.

Nearly 6,000,000 Canadians are eligible to mark ballots with an "X," the Dominion election law recognizing no systems like proportional representation or the transferable vote.

Two Withdraw

It is the biggest election Canada ever saw considering the number of parties and the number of candidates. A total of 892 candidates will fight it out for 245 seats. During the week-end two officially nominated candidates in the Montreal district, Leslie Bell and William B. Balkie, announced their withdrawal. Mr. Bell was running as a Conservative in St. Antoine-Westmount, and Mr. Balkie was an independent Liberal in Mount Royal.

Continuing a custom of his Liberal Leader King ended a campaign Saturday night at Ottawa. Premier Bennett and Hon. Mr. Stevens also delivered nationwide broadcasts.

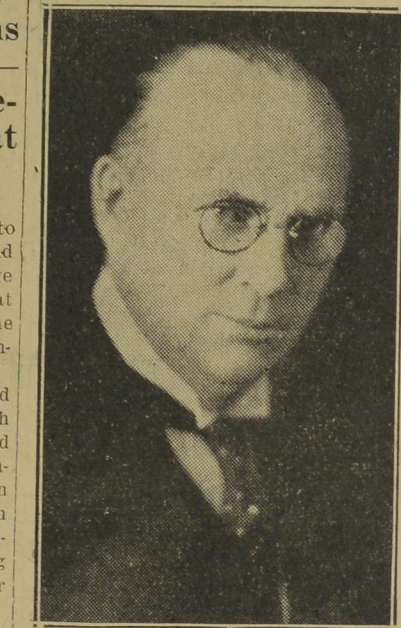

OPEN NEW FIELDS TO THE PROSPECTORS

OTTAWA, Oct. 14—Hon. W. A. Gordon, minister of mines, announces that large areas of territory favorable to prospecting had been brought to light as a result of this season's geological survey work which sent 188 parties to the field in 65 projects financed by \$1,000,000 provided under the supplementary public works act.

The surveys found territory suitable to prospecting for gold and at least one prominent silver area. Those geologists who have already returned from the field are busy preparing their reports which will be made available to prospectors next year. Meanwhile the minister reserved extended comment on the work.

BEATTY SAYS STEVENS MADE FALSE STATEMENT

No Connection With
the Selection of
Candidates

(Special to The Daily Mail)
MONTREAL, Oct. 14—Sir Edward Beatty denies that he had anything to do with the choice of any candidate seeking election in the present campaign. In reply to a somewhat pointed reference made by Hon. Mr. Stevens in his radio address Saturday night, Sir Edward Beatty today issued the following statement:

"The Hon. H. H. Stevens' genius for inaccurate statements is well known. But in asserting in his radio broadcast on Saturday night that I had a part in the selection of Hon. R. R. Bruce as Liberal candidate in East Kootenay, he seems to have drawn his imagination to an unusual degree.

Naturally, I have not the remotest connection with the selection of any candidates of any political party in Canada. I have never made any representations to Mr. King, Mr. Bennett, Mr. Woodsworth or Mr. Aherhart or to anyone on their behalf nor have I been consulted by any one of them. Even Mr. Stevens overlooked me."

HAUPTMANN COST TO STATE SET AT \$162,713

TRENTON, New Jersey, Oct. 14—The Lindbergh kidnapping investigation and the trial of Bruno Richard Hauptmann cost New Jersey \$162,713. Hauptmann's trial at Flemington brought bills totalling \$125,000, and Col. H. Norman Schwarzkopf, state police superintendent, recently told a legislative committee the three-year investigation cost his department \$37,713. He said this was absorbed in regular state police appropriations.

Joseph Lanigan, Assistant Attorney General, in appearing before the appropriation committee, said the Federal Government spent approximately \$800,000 and the New York City police \$250,000.

Is The World Civilized?

There are not many persons here who will agree with President De Valera of the Irish Free State in regard to his extreme ideas of political affairs within the Empire. But Mr. De Valera delivered an address a few days ago before the League of Nations in which he urged that effective intervention be made to stop the Italian-Ethiopian conflict, and about every person will agree with some views which he expressed on the subject. "Unless the spirit of justice to all nations prevails the League as a factor is doomed," said Mr. De Valera, and in this case he is right.

There is no person but can be impressed with the contrast between the high and lofty ideals enunciated by the League in former years and the despair which prevails in its midst today. Formerly high ideals of peace were presented to the League by the representatives of different nations. Today the cynic is the teacher. He tells you that man in the long run is only a beast, his destiny ruled by selfishness and passion, force is the weapon and victory rests with the most brutal. It is only the fool who credits such dreams as peace.

Today before the anguished hearts of countless mothers have even got a respite from the anguish of the last great war we are awaiting and perhaps expecting another conflict and one which possibly might end old world civilization. It is not probable that we on this side of the Atlantic would be such fools as to get dragged into it. An eleventh hour attempt is being made to prevent these European nations from springing like brutes at each other's throats and from mutilating and destroying again. And the League finds this a difficult problem — and we in the twentieth century call ourselves civilized.

Why cannot the nations put into enterprises of peace the energies they are prepared to squander in the futility and frightfulness of war?

There are no finances to give the workless the opportunity of earning their bread, money unlimited is found to provide for the manufacture of instruments of destruction.

Why can we not in a spirit of justice deal with wrongs when we perceive them? Not every demand for change deserves to be listened to, it is true, but must we wait until the wronged have risen up in armed revolt before we grant them the redress to which we know they are entitled?

Why, if the problems are economic and it is the fear of withholding essential raw material that is causing alarm, why cannot these questions and their relation to colonial possessions be discussed now? Or will our conservatism—the natural philosophy of those who have and are concerned only to retain—will this conservatism give its consent and deem the time ripe only when the slaughter has begun? Are adjustments never to be made but at the expense of the weak?

The manner in which this affair is settled will determine whether the League will survive or whether its usefulness is gone.

Peace on earth is what we should aim to have. It is to be hoped that whatever happens amongst the nations of the world that Canada will keep out of conflicts.

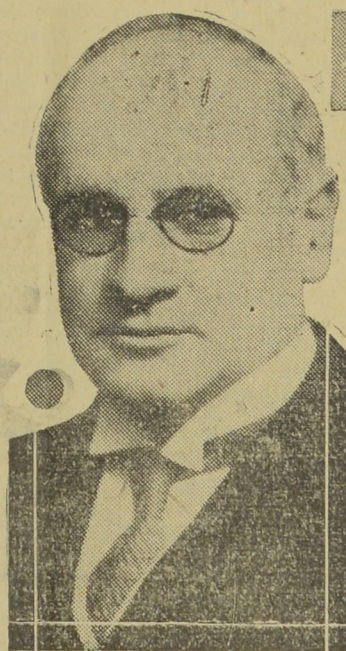

Abolish High School Entrance Exams.

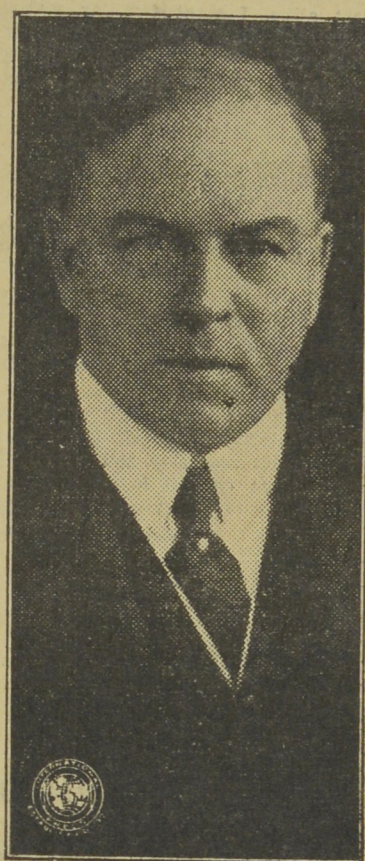
The Moncton School Board abolished High School Entrance examinations at a special meeting Friday night.

MARINA'S FATHER SUGGESTED FOR KING OF GREECE

Pretender to Throne
Will Fight for
Crown

From Paris came a report that King George was refusing to return to Greece in view of the circumstances under which the coup was effected, saying Greece could get a king in the person of Prince Nicholas, George's uncle and father of the former Princess Marina, now the Duchess of Kent.

(In Saragoza, Spain, Prince Eugene Lascaris, a pretender to the Greek throne, declared his followers would "convert Greece into a river of blood" unless he was placed on the throne. He termed George a "usurper.")

PLAN MARITIME CONFERENCE OF NURSING ORDER

First to be Held by Vic-
torian Order — Will
Meet in Halifax

For the first time in the history of the Order in these provinces, a Maritime Conference of the Victorian Order of Nurses for Canada will be held next month it was announced at the monthly meeting of the local branch of the association which was held last evening in Moncton at the home of Mrs. E. A. Killem, Highfield street, with the president Mrs. J. S. Doyle, in the chair.

The sessions will be held in Halifax in the Lord Nelson Hotel and the delegates are to be entertained at luncheon by the Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Nova Scotia at Government House. Several representatives from Moncton will be present, it is expected. Miss Winnifred Dawson, district supervisor, who was at the meeting, explained the plans for the conference which will be for board members. Many of the nurses-in-charge will also be present.

Italian Minister Refused Radio Broadcast from Geneva Speaks from Rome.

GENEVA, Oct. 14—If the plans for a financial blockade of Italy which are being presented today to the committee of 18 by the sanctions committee are strictly applied, Italy's foreign trade will practically be halted.

If the general committee of 52 as well as the committee of 18 approve it, members of the League will be urged promptly to pass legislation giving it full effect.

The British are pressing for speed and want quick economic sanctions to back up the financial sanction, outlined by the small sub-committee.

A Havas despatch from Addis Ababa said Italy and Ethiopia were reported to have an understanding that Italy will not bombard the Addis Ababa-Djibouti railway as long as the road is kept free of arms shipments.

Long streams of Ethiopian warriors numbering more than 200,000 men, were converging late yesterday on the southwestern front in Ethiopia to attack the left flank of the Italian army now moving on Harar.

The Ethiopian leader Ras Desta Demtu, son-in-law of Emperor Haile Selassie, ordered his savage fighters to attempt to turn the flank of the Italian forces, commanded by General Graziana, in a desolate, waterless region near the British Somaliland frontier.

"The exact size of the Italian forces in this area is not known."

Luigi Vinci-Gigliucci, Italian minister to Addis Ababa, held a virtual prison there following his refusal to leave in accordance with Emperor Haile Selassie's instructions, stated yesterday that "nothing will stop Mussolini from conquering Ethiopia."

The Ethiopian government Saturday announced the recapture of Adowa but information from the northern front revealed later that the report was without foundation.

The Italian high commissioner of Eritrea, General de Bono, was on the way to Adowa, to formally annex it. He was scheduled to arrive yesterday and dedicate a war memorial to Italys dead in the disastrous Adowa battle of 1896.

In Rome Baron Pompeo Aloisi, chief Italian delegate to Geneva, made a broadcast speech to North America in which he said a "peaceful settlement of the Italo-Ethiopian controversy was possible." The League must discard its "policy of two weights and two measures" and must change its covenant to "harmonize" with modern times, he said.

Early Peace Moves Are Indicated

An authoritative source in the Italian capital said: "By the end of October I believe there can be useful conversation," indicating peace moves might be in sight.

In Paris Premier Laval issued a statement saying he had not considered military sanctions at all in conversations with British diplomats.

MARSHALL KING DIED AT HANWELL

The death occurred yesterday at his home in Hanwell, of Marshall King, at the advanced age of 86 years. Mr. King lived all his life in Hanwell, where he made his living from the land and was a hardy tiller of the soil for many years. He came of a family that is highly respected throughout these sections. The deceased was twice married and leaves to mourn his loss three sons and two daughters, Peter King, Kingsclear, Archie King, Vancouver; Joseph L. King, Hanwell; Mrs. F. Landry, in Nova Scotia; Mrs. Levi Burgoyne of Fredericton; two brothers, Savoy King, St. Stephen; Jack King, Myshall Settlement; also one sister, Mrs. Peter Goodine, Greenville. The funeral will be held tomorrow morning. High Mass of Requiem will be conducted at Hanwell church at ten o'clock, Rev. Father Coughlan conducting the service and interment will be made in the adjoining churchyard.
