

## BALLOTING ON TODAY SUNBURY YORK COUNTIES

Excitement of Federal  
Election Prevails in  
Capital Today

20 Polling Places Here

Streets Alive With Peo-  
ple and Cars Carry-  
ing Voters

Dominion election day is here again and Fredericton, the capital of the province along with other parts of York and Sunbury Counties is busy making its choice of candidate for Ottawa from this constituency. The two main polling places in the city, the York County court house and the City Hall, were bustling with activity from eight o'clock this morning when voting commenced. In all there are twenty polling booths in the city.

As everybody is fully aware by this time the three candidates for York-Sunbury are Hon. R. B. Hanson, K. C., M.P., Minister of Trade and Commerce, who is the Conservative candidate; His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark, who is the Liberal candidate; and E. O. MacDonald, the Reconstructionist candidate.

### Plenty of Excitement

There was excitement in the city today, plenty of it for a federal election comes once in about four or five years. Both polling places were beehives of activity. Automobiles of all three parties crowded the streets, hurrying here and there, and carrying voters to the polls. Hundreds of people hung about the polls interested in the proceedings and there was chatter and gossip on the prospects of the respective candidates for this constituency.

Arrangements for balloting had been completed last week. Sheriff Roy Smith is chief returning officer. The deputy returning officers were at their stands as early as eight o'clock this morning.

While today was not a public holiday, election day is always a day of partial relaxed diligence on the part of workers everywhere. An election is in the air and both employers and employees take occasion to argue the pros and cons of the occasion. The

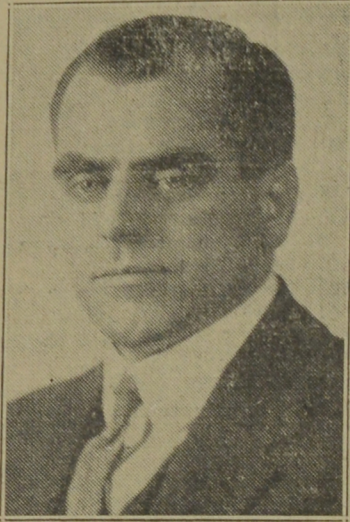
### WORLD AND ITS BALANCE

## CONSTABLE MILLER OF R. C. M. P. DIES

Word Received by Head-  
quarters Here Today  
of Officer's Death

Newcastle Accident

Sergeant Fred Lucas Al-  
so Reported in Ser-  
ious Condition

The news was received at headquarters of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police here today of the death at four o'clock this morning of Constable Daniel Miller of the Newcastle detachment of the R. C. M. P. Miller, along with Sergeant Fred Lucas of the Fredericton detachment had been in the Miramichi hospital at Newcastle following an auto accident in which their car had crashed into the railing at the approach to French Fort Cove Bridge on the outskirts of Newcastle.

It was reported also today that Sergeant Lucas spent a restless night and his condition today was reported as serious. The accident occurred on October 9th.

The automobile in which both police officers were driving became wedged in the smashed railing, thus preventing it from hurtling down a 100-foot embankment into the Miramichi River. Miller suffered a fractured skull and other serious injuries while Lucas was badly cut.

From police headquarters here today it was learned that no inquest will be held as the occurrence was accidental. Funeral arrangements for the victim is a native of Mooseminia Saskatchewan.

## WEST INDIES COMMISSIONER OF TRADE EXPECTED

Will Speak to Board of  
Trade, Exporters, on  
October 22

Trade Matters Up

Attempt to Have H. R.  
Boussette to  
Speak Also

W. F. Bull, Canadian Trade Commissioner for the British West Indies, is expected to be in Fredericton on October 22 on which date it is expected he will speak to the Board of Trade here, also exporters of apples, fish, and potatoes, as well as others interested in Canada's trade. Announcement to this effect was made today by G. C. Cunningham, local agent of the Eastern Canada Potato Marketing Board.

An attempt will also be made to have H. R. Boussette, Canadian trade commissioner from Liverpool, England, to speak here at the same time. It is planned to have both trade commissioners to address the monthly meeting of the Fredericton Board of Trade at which exporters and others interested will likely be present.

The two visitors will probably speak in connection with Canada's trade and the respective markets of the British West Indies and Great Britain.

Mr. Boussette had originally planned to arrive here on November 1 but the officials here will endeavor to have his visit coincide with that of the British West Indies commissioner.

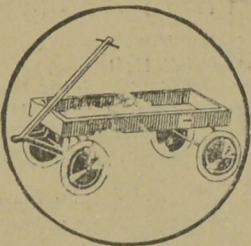
