

NO ABUNDANCE HAY IN N. B. THIS SEASON

Crop In Central And Southern Parts Is Light Says Reports.

Not Serious

Fair Crop Of Hay For Maritimes Is Report Of District Inspector

The hay crop for the central and southern part of the province is reported to be light this year and while the situation is not likely to be serious officials feel that the crop this season will be somewhat under that of last year for those portions. In the northern portions, where last year there was a serious shortage, the situation is reported to be better this season.

Fair Crop For Maritimes

Generally in the maritime provinces there will be a fair hay crop according to a bulletin issued recently by G. LeLacheur, district inspector of the Dominion seed branch at Sackville. Mr. LeLacheur reports further that continued showery weather is delaying cutting and may injure the quality for market.

From the Dominion Experimental Station here today it was learned that there will be no abundance of hay and quite possibly there will be a shortage.

Respecting the increased competition in the Maritimes, due to hay shipments from Quebec, it is reported that there was a large carryover in Quebec and a good crop there again this season, with May prices down to \$8 per ton at country points. Those farmers who have top quality will command highest prices in a buyers' market, it is believed.

The two men were arrested by the R.C.M.P. yesterday afternoon on the Saint John road about seven miles below this city and a five-gallon keg of contraband rum was confiscated.
