

PROGRESS IN PROPAGATION OF PHEASANTS

Fish and Game Assoc.
Branch Hears Encour-
aging Report

Farmers Interested

Nearly a Half Million of
Trout Fry Have Been
Distributed

The report given by the local Game Bird Committee of the Fredericton Branch of the New Brunswick Fish & Game Protective Association at last night's meetings shows that the propagation of pheasants in the district is reaching proportions of magnitude over 1200 eggs have been produced by the birds owned by the local Branch. A number of these eggs have been distributed to interested farmers and others in the district and the balance have been raised to liberation age by members of the Committee. Of the latter closer records are available and the record of raising healthy birds to the high proportion of 60 per cent of the eggs set it is believed is approaching a national record. The quiet unostentatious work of the local Branch is certainly producing results.

TROUT FRY DISTRIBUTED

An enthusiastic meeting of the executive of the Fredericton Branch of the Fish & Game Protective Association was held last night with a good attendance. The reports of the various committees showed this branch is functioning actively. Of particular interest was the report of the Fish Stocking Committee as presented by the Chairman. This report showed that nearly a half million trout fry have been distributed by this local committee during the present season in the following streams:—Nashwaak-sis and branches, McBean, Manzer Mill Stream, Long's Creek, North Tay Pidgeon Brook, Cross Creek, Middle Brook, Poklok, Kelley Brook, Clinch Brook and Harvey Lake. While these trout fry are supplied from the Federal Government Hatcheries the distribution is in the hands of the men of the local committee who give their time and work gratuitously all for the inherent love of the game of true sportsmen. This large number of fish placed in the strategic locations chosen after careful study are bound to provide good entertainment in the next few years. Unselfish service such as this is to be commended.

DAMAGE IN YORK COUNTY IN BIG STORM

Electric Light Service
Impaired as Transfor-
mer is Blown Out

'Phone Cable Trouble

Other Damage as Sea-
son's Biggest Storm
Occurs

York county was smitten with its worst thunder and lightning storm of the season last evening between the hours of eight and ten o'clock, when almost an inch of rain fell and lightning damaged electric light service and telephone and telegraph lines.

The rainfall afforded relief to the heat-stricken residents of this part of the province who sweltered in a 97-degree temperature all yesterday.

A giant transformer on Carleton street was blown out by the storm and all the lower section of the city was cut off from electric light service temporarily. The N. B. Telephone Company reports that cable trouble was experienced on Waterloo Row and that several poll lines in the outlying districts were upset. Generally wire service of all kinds has been impaired.

Several hours rain of flood proportions occurred. Fredericton was deluged in rain from about eight o'clock until ten o'clock. The thunder and lightning was especially prominent, and one flash of lightning hit one of the lead-in wires of radio station CPNB, doing temporary damage. It was a particularly vicious roll of thunder which followed this. Some damage was done in the countryside also, trees being hit by the lightning. There were no human casualties reported in the county.

The rain was a not unwelcome aftermath to the 91-degree temperature which existed here yesterday and caused general distress to the citizens. Friday's temperature was the climax of several days of very hot weather. The rainfall was terrific while it lasted. After the storm the street intersections were flooded with water. The intersection at Brunswick and Carleton streets was a pool of water and passing cars caused a great splash. Today the temperature was somewhat cooler, although the mercury began to rise again this afternoon.

Rural telephone and electric service was impaired by the storm and today employees of both were busily engaged in making adjustments. Phone connection with Oromocto and places down river was difficult this morning and repairmen were engaged in fixing up the service today. Up river there was some damage also. At Springhill light service was impaired by the storm. There was difficulty in communicating with many of the rural districts today.

FREDERICTON MAN RETURNS FROM OXFORD

Jack Babbitt, Son of Mr.
and Mrs. H. R. Babbitt,
May Remain Here

Brilliant Student

Has Been Doing Re-
search Work at Oxford
University

Jack Babbitt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold R. Babbitt, Lansdowne street, arrived today at noon from Montreal, having arrived from England earlier this week on "The Empress of Britain," after six years spent at Oxford University.

Mr. Babbitt went from the University of New Brunswick as Rhodes Scholar to Oxford in 1929, and is considered one of the most brilliant students and athletes ever to be awarded the Rhodes scholarship from this university. After completing his regular studies the Fredericton man began research work in Physics, his major subject, and last year, besides engaging further in this work he also taught some on the side.

Speaking with The Daily Mail today Mr. Babbitt said that he probably would stay here indefinitely. His plans for the future are still uncertain, he said. His trip over the ocean was uneventful.

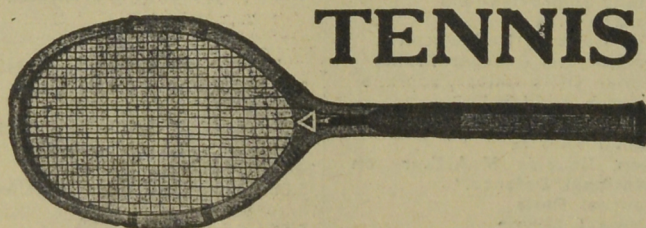

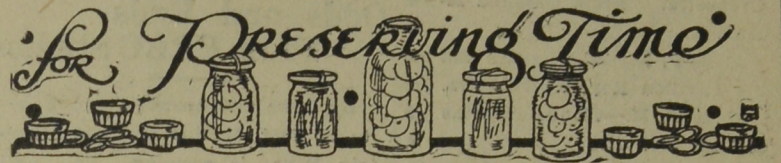
