NEW YORK TO PLAY MONTREAL ENGLISH TEAM

MONTREAL, Nov. 9—The Montreal rugby team to play New York here on Saturday at the M.A.A.A. grounds has now been practically completed with several changes necessary, owing to the Bank of Montreal players being unavailable. While the fullback position has not been definitely filled the three-quarter line will consist of Partridge, McGill; Keeping, M.A.A.A.; Rabnett, McGill; and Hodgson, Verdun. This line, with Patterson and Keeping at half, should produce a very fine exhibition of open play. In the forwards the vacancies have been filled by bringing in Gilman, formerly of the Bank of Montreal and Hingston of the Wanderers and these changes, owing to withdrawal of two of the bank forwards, should not materially weaken the side to any extent.

The visiting New York team has now made known the members who have been selected and the side appears to be a most interesting one. The French Rugby Club of New York supplies the majority of the players including Roger Dumestre, who is also captain of the visitor, and he formerly played in best class English rugby in France, having been a member of the Tarbes (France) Club. Other French players are Jean St-Cricq, also formerly of Tarbes; Victor Cazeneuve, formerly of Stade Nagzais France; Couhen, Sheen and Campione all members of the French Rugby club of Paris.

Other of the visiting players include Taylor, formerly of the Dublin Wanderers and now playing for the New York City Rugby Club; Condon, formerly of Tipperary, Ireland; William

Bruins, Canadiens Play 2-2 Draw in Quebec Game

Paul Haynes Gets Tying Marker in Third Period.

QUEBEC, Nov. 8—A third-period goal by Paul Haynes against his former teammates gave Montreal Canadiens a 2-2 tie last night with Boston Bruins as the National Hockey League teams continued their pre-schedule series started in Saint John, N. B., October 28. The teams are all square with two wins each and two tie-games.

Rapidly rounding into peak condition the major leaguers gave a fast exhibition before a small crowd that watched Canadiens take a first-period lead on Johnny Gagnon's scoring shot after a pass from the smooth-working Haynes.

Bruins came back in the second period with a two-goal attack to lead 2-1 at the end of the period. Bill Cowley, leading goal-getter of the Maritime Hockey League two seasons ago, tied the score on a three-man combination with Peggy O'Neill, and Alex Motter, then Red Beattie soloed his way in for another marker near the end of the period.

Shortly after the third period opened Haynes topped off a brilliant display at centre when he took a pass from Walter Buswell for the tying goal. Great work by Tiny Thompson and Wilf Cude, rival goal keepers, Irvin Frew and Pit Lepine were absent from the Canadiens' lineup as the result of strenuous games in the Maritimes. Frew is out with a dislocated shoulder for probably two weeks more and Lepine is nursing an injured thumb but may be able to play in the next exhibition between the teams scheduled here Sunday.

Just at present things look pretty dull for the Fredericton City Rugby team. The latest report from the Mount Allison camp is that that team will not compete further in senior rugby this year. So it looks as if Monday's game is off and City will have to cool their heels a little longer while Caledonia and the Halifax City League Champions finish their season—then it will be time for hockey. And so it goes year after year—Fredericton City all dressed up and no place to go.

While many bids are being tendered for the lease on the Arctic Rink this winter it is the first time in the history of the rink that a bid has been received from the city of Saint John. It seems that a Saint John firm is interested in getting the Fredericton rink this year, according to one of the directors of the Arctic Rink Co. The same director said that a Saint John outfit bought all the spare hockey equipment that the Rink Company had the other day. Does this mean we are going to see a revival of the old Southern Hockey League? With the decline and fall of the "Big Four" it looks as though the old Southern League would be just the thing for a few winters. With Saint John sprinkling a few of her saltier players amongst teams in Fredericton and Moncton a good fast competitive league could be formed. It is worth thinking about.

The decision on the part of the Students' Representative Council at the University of New Brunswick to resurface the College rugby field comes as a much needed "reform." In recent years the old field has developed a bad case of "rolly-polies" as well as hardening of the epidermis. Perhaps this is the solution to the failure of the U.N.B. team to make a showing in football this fall—next year the boys can bounce around on the springy soil of the new field and feel none the worse for their experience, but bouncing around on the field in its present condition is sure to cause many sore spots on the tender posteriors of the U.N.B. laddies.

Since the departure of Murray Ross for Acadia U.N.B. has been without the services of a basketball coach and the position is now open. So far no aspirants for the position have been mentioned. The Red and Black under the guidance of Ross made one of the best showings in history last year and the shoes of that flashy little playing coach will be hard to fill.

LONDON, England, Nov. 9 — Lord Hewart, Lord Chief Justice, making an after dinner speech last night, laid down these maxims:

"A judge is essentially a parasite, because in a perfect world judges will not be necessary and for something like 799 million years the world got on very well without them."

"It is the business of a judge to hold his tongue until the last possible moment and to try to be as wise as he is paid to look."

"The only impartiality possible to the human mind is that which arises from an outstanding of neither side of the case."

Lord Hewart, recalled that once when visiting a pensioners' hospital, he asked one inmate how he passed the time. The pensioner replied, "Sometimes we sit and think and sometimes we just sit." That, said Lord Hewart, "is the perfect description of a judge's day."
