#### HEAVY FROST TODAY

A heavy white frost clung to the earth this morning, it being one of the coldest mornings of the current fall season. Thermometers registered as low as 29 degrees at an early hour. In many places ice had formed. The "little man" on the city hall fountain was covered with icicles for the first time this year.

#### A VISITING M. P.

Henry R. Emmerson of Dorchester, M. P. elect for Westmorland, passed through the city by auto yesterday on his way home after a business trip to up-river points. Here as well as elsewhere during his trip he was overwhelmed with congratulations on his success in redeeming Westmorland for the Liberal, at the recent election. It was Mr. Emmerson's third time over the course and he won out by a majority in excess of ten thousand, one of the largest obtained in Canada in proportion to the number of registered voters. Mr. Emmerson was opposed by the late Federal member for the county and also by a Reconstructionist and both lost their deposits. The new member for Westmorland is the only son of the late Hon. H. R. Emmerson, a former premier of the province who later, while representing Westmorland, became Minister of Railways and Canals under Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

### REMEMBRANCE DAY CEREMONY AT CENOTAPH ON MONDAY

Impressive Ceremony to be Conducted at Cenotaph, Commencing at 10.45 a.m.—110 Graves of War Dead Will be Decorated by Canadian Legion — Lieutenant Governor Among Those Who Will Place Wreaths.

Monday, Remembrance Day, will be celebrated here as well as in other parts of the world by the usual impressive ceremonies at the local Cenotaph, marking the seventeenth year since the signing of the Armistice, ending the Great War of 1914-18.

The ceremony which commences at 10:45 A. M. will be featured by the two minutes of silence at eleven o'clock, and by special addresses. The local branch of the Canadian Legion has arranged the usual elaborate program for the event, and many are expected to attend.

One of the outstanding features of the Remembrance Day program will be the decoration of one hundred and ten graves of Canadian Legion comrades who were killed in the great conflict. Of this total number 52 are at the Rural cemetery, five in the Hermitage, 33 in the Rural cemetery extension, 14 in the Soldiers' Plot at the Old Burial ground, and 6 at the Forest Hill cemetery. Eleven of this total are buried in Flanders field, although a wreath will be placed on monuments erected in the cemeteries here.

While the main Remembrance Day program is scheduled for Monday morning, on Sunday members of the local branch of the Canadian Legion, B. E. S. L. will meet at the club quarters on Queen street and at 10:30 o'clock will march to the Brunswick Street Baptist church where divine service will be conducted by Rev. G. W. Guion, the pastor. Rev. Mr. Guion was a major in the Princess Pats during the Great War.

On Monday the Legion members will assemble at the club quarters at ten o'clock and will proceed from there to the cenotaph where their's will be the major part in the annual service there. Medals and poppies will be worn by the Legionnaires.

The principal address at the Cenotaph is to be delivered by Rev. Dr. George E. Ross, pastor of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church. His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark will deliver the opening remarks and Very Rev. Dean J. H. A. Holmes will conduct scripture reading and prayer. Comrade Endall will read the city's Honor Roll. As in past years a large number of wreaths will be placed on the cenotaph, many organizations, and private individuals too, joining in this tribute to Fredericton's war dead. Mayor Clark will call out the list. Rev. J. W. Bartlett will pronounce the benediction, to be followed by the soundings of the Last post and Reveille and the National Anthem. The hymns, "O God Our Help in Ages Past", and "Abide With Me", will be sung. The spearhead of the ceremony is, of course, the observance of the two minutes of silence, when all will stand in quiet reverence.

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### ROAD PLOUGHING EXPERIMENT FOR N. B. HIGHWAYS

Premier and Chief Engineer Confer On Matter

Announcement Soon  
Cost of Ploughing Likely to be Absorbed by Gas Revenue

Hon. A. A. Dysart, premier and minister of public works, was in conference for more than an hour this morning with C. B. Crossdale, chief highway engineer, while they discussed possible plans for the ploughing of provincial highways this winter. The matter of keeping the highways open for traffic in winter is being seriously considered by the present government, but as yet no definite plan has been mapped out, the premier announced following this morning's conference with the chief highway engineer. He said that an announcement regarding the whole matter would be made in a few days.

It is expected that the ploughing of several stretches of highway will be maintained this winter as an experiment, and if it proves successful from an economical and practical standpoint will be expanded and continued from year to year. The experiment had been carried out in Ontario with success, said Premier Dysart. It is thought that the expense of maintenance during the winter would be taken care of by the revenue from gasoline, but the question of the municipalities share in co-operating with the government has not been discussed or decided as yet. The premier leaves this afternoon for Moncton where he will speak over a province-wide radio hookup tomorrow night from 9 to 9.30 p.m. He was accompanied to Moncton by his three children, Miss Miriam Dysart, Miss Mary Dysart and Robert Dysart.

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
