## FRED WARING INTRODUCES NEW MOVIE TUNES

Fred Waring's Pennsylvanians, abetted by Kay Thompson, Stella, and Her Fellows and the girls glee club, will introduce songs from Dixie Lee's new picture, "Love in Bloom", in their broadcast over the WABC-Columbia network from 10:30 to 11:30 P. M., A. S. T., tonight. This will be the first time the tunes will have been played publicly. The picture is to be released by Paramount at a later date. Babs Ryan and her brothers, Rosemary and Priscilla Lane, Tom Waring, Poley McClutock and Johnny Davis will be heard in solo parts.
