

JOHN DOUGLASS ATTENDED FAIR 77 YEARS AGO

Celebrated His Eight-fourth Birthday Yesterday at Red Rock

Attended First Fair

Has Won Many Prizes and Is Still an Active Participant in Event.

John Douglass, honorary president of the Stanley Agricultural Society, who attended the first Stanley Fair in 1858, was honored yesterday by the directors of the fair on his 84th birthday. A fine gift was presented to the venerable president of the Agricultural Society who has not missed a fair since the first one which was held 77 years ago.

The esteemed veteran of the fair is enjoying the best of health and expresses the hope of attending a good many more Stanley Fairs. He has always been an active participant at the annual event and has won many prizes for his exhibits from year to year.

He usually has exhibits in many of the departments, but his special pride is in his exhibits of field roots and vegetables. Mr. Douglass is a pioneer farmer of Stanley and raises his fine specimens of vegetables and root crops on the farm he has occupied since he was born. He is also a sheep breeder of great fame and owns a fine flock of Leicester sheep.

James G. Thorburn, the president, and T. Allan Best, secretary-treasurer of the Stanley Fair paid a special visit yesterday to Mr. and Mrs. Douglass at their home at Red Rock and with the other directors celebrated with Mr. Douglass his 84th birthday.

Several Appointments of Justices of Peace and Judges of Probate

Resignations Accepted

Business of Executive Council About Half Completed

The executive council of the Province of New Brunswick met this morning and Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, premier and minister of lands and mines made announcement of the following appointments. In Gloucester county: Joy W. Jenkins, Burnt Land Brook, was appointed justice of the peace.

In Restigouche county, Charles W. Nelson, Dalhousie, Justice of the Peace. In York County, John Black, barrister, Fredericton, was appointed judge of probate, pro hoc vice, in the estate of T. Wesley Kitchen and Julia A. Kitchen. In Carleton county, Kenneth McDougall, Woodstock, was appointed an auctioneer. John Hamilton, Lower Kars, Kings county got the appointment of justice of the peace.

St. John County

In St. John County, Otty Vaughn, St. John city, was made justice of the peace, Edward D. Walsh, chartered accountant was appointed commissioner for taking affidavits to be read in the supreme court; Walter H. Gamblin was made justice of the peace and George Edward Murphy was also made justice of the peace.

Harold Davidson, barrister, Newcastle, was appointed judge of probate, pro hac vice, in the estate of Moses Schaeffer. Gordon Kennedy of Edmundston was made a justice of the peace. F. L. Tower, Parish of Lancaster, St. John county was added to the justice of peace appointments.

Resignations

Two resignations were accepted by the council and included those of Norman H. Beach, agricultural representative, to take effect Jan. 31, 1935, and Miss Jean Leger of the Department of Agriculture, with three months leave of absence.

The premier announced that there would be a meeting of the Board of Education tomorrow morning.

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

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
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
