HIS MAJESTY REPLIES

A letter from His Majesty The King in which appreciation of the address sent to him by the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire, on the occasion of his Silver Jubilee, was read at the meeting of the National Executive at the headquarters at Toronto. The letter forwarded by His Excellency the Governor-General referred particularly to the sincere and loyal language in which the illuminated addresses were couched.

Topics suggested by the Empire Study Convener for chapter study this year were the Reign of King George V—using as textbook "The Kings Grace" by John Buchan, and General Hornby's Plan for Empire Settlement. He continued, "But it must be a great relief to him. Being interviewed by as many as 200 people a day wouldn't be any fun—and he had to please them all."

When asked how he thought Hon. A. A. Dysart, premier-elect would make out, he replied, "My Dysart is like Mr. Tilley, his heart is too big. To be a political leader a man should have a heart of stone."

"Mr. Dysart will find it no bed of roses—he will age as fast as Premier Tilley did," concluded the philosophical government employee.

A meeting of the Fredericton Presbytery of the United Church of Canada met on Tuesday morning in the Sheffield United Church with the chairman, Rev. Harry Burns, presiding. After a period of devotion led by the chairman, the roll was called when the following members answered their names: Revs. Geo. Telford, Dr. Wightman, W. A. Burge, M. D. Oliver, J. E. Shanklin, R. W. Barker, R. H. Barker, J. H. Sulston, H. Burns, W. J. Domville, H. H. Blanchard, Mr. Upham, E. E. Fyche, H. J. Rowley, D. R. Chown and J. S. Gregg.

N. B. Medical Society Ends Annual

A resolution was adopted thanking the Canadian Medical Association for extramural meetings or courses of post-graduate instructions which were given by teams of visiting speakers from university centres to doctors in their home towns throughout the provinces of Canada. This work was appreciated tremendously by members of the New Brunswick Society, it was said.

At the dinner Dr. Menzies was presented with the Society's VanWart golf trophy by the original donor Dr. G. C. VanWart. Among 16 competitors, Dr. Menzies won the trophy with a net 67. It was held last year by Dr. William Warwick, of this city, chief medical health officer.

In his presidential address, Dr. Malcolm praised two New Brunswick doctors, whose work he said, while acclaimed outside the province, had not been fully realized by New Brunswickers. He referred to Dr. Stanley Bridges of Saint John, who, he said, with only local help brought up the Mahaney quadruplets successfully contrasting this case with the world-wide prominence given the Dionne quintuplets and Dr. Dafee and the State's aid which was given in that case.

The other physician to whom he referred was Dr. W. F. Roberts, of Saint John who had practically single-handed established a provincial health department and founded the provincial laboratory. Dr. Roberts' handling of the 1918-19 influenza epidemic received world-wide approval, Dr. Malcolm said. Dr. Roberts had established properly a department of vital statistics and had rid the province of smallpox and typhoid.

Dr. Pendrigh proposed a toast to the guests, Dr. J. C. Meakins and Dr. T. C. Routley, president and secretary, respectively, of the Canadian Medical Association, replied.
