

OFFICIAL CORD 128 CU. FEET NOW IN EFFECT

Civic Authorities Receive Word of New Measurement

Official Cord

By-law Respecting Sale of Wood Could be Studied to Advantage

Announcement was made today at the city hall that the new cord—128 feet—is now in general effect in the city and throughout Canada. Formerly the official cord was 138 feet.

According to an act in the Dominion Parliament of June 28th 1935, the official cord in the city of Fredericton will be one Hundred and Twenty-Eight Cubic feet (128). This cord will be the official cord for the Dominion, also.

Wood haulers would do well to study the following by-law and govern themselves, accordingly chapter 22, section 13.—The City Council may at any time appoint a fit and competent person to be surveyor of firewood brought into the city for sale and sold or offered for sale by the load and it shall be the duty of such surveyor to attend at Phoenix Square Market and each place or places as may be necessary and accurately measure every load of firewood offered for sale and to place a tag thereon showing the quantity of wood in each load and the date of measurement and no person shall sell or offer for sale any load of firewood in the city unless and until such load of wood shall have been measured and shall have attached thereto the measurement tag as aforesaid. The owner or person in charge of any load of firewood offered for sale or sold with in the city upon the same being measured and tagged as in the last preceding section required shall pay to the surveyor a fee of ten cents for each load so measured.

Any person selling or offering for sale any load of firewood within the city without the same having been first measured and tagged as aforesaid or who shall refuse to pay the fee therefor required by this by-law and liable to any penalty herein prescribed.

Any other information regarding these by-laws can be received from the city clerk or surveyor.

INVITATION EXTENDED TO ALL FOR PICNIC

Labor Day Affair Likely To Be Finest Ever Held in Province

Prepare for Event

Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King To Be Present Is Reported

In answer to a question asked by several people, the committee in charge of the big Liberal picnic to be held at Maple Glen Farm on Labor Day, wish to state that all voters in the joint constituency of York and Sunbury counties are invited to attend whether they are Liberal or not. Everything in connection with the picnic will be provided free of charge by the Liberal committee and nothing will be sold on the ground.

Reports from different places received by the chairman of the committee already indicate that the picnic will be a grand success. At a meeting of the committee last evening several details were arranged. Different booths will be erected and will be decorated in red, green, blue and yellow colors and tickets in corresponding colors will be supplied to those who attend the picnic so that they can go to the colored booths indicated on their ticket and get their lunch, ice cream and other refreshments including different fruit, drinks absolutely free.

The committee is arranging to have games, both for the children and the grownups. These will include softball, tug-of-war and races for young and old, both male and female. No one will be too old or too young, or too fat or too thin, but which he or she may take part if they wish.

King May Be Here

Communication today from the private secretary of Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, states that it is very possible that Hon. Mr. King will be present at the mammoth picnic.

Final word in this regard is expected to be received later today. The ladies' committee of the Liberal Association are doing their part to make the preparations a success. This committee will look after the catering, and as it is expected that close onto five thousand people will be present at the picnic it will be seen that they have no small job. One item alone calls for 15,000 sandwiches and it will probably take half a ton of different kinds of cake and everything else in proportion. This picnic is expected to be the largest affair of its kind ever held in York or Sunbury counties and will probably surpass anything of its kind ever held in New Brunswick. The grounds of Maple Glen Farm situated only about seven miles from town is especially adapted for picnic purposes and His Worship Mayor Clark who is the Liberal candidate in this constituency, and who owns the property, has very kindly placed the grounds at the disposal of the Liberal party for this occasion.

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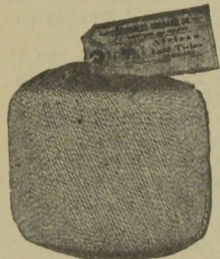
