"SOMEWHERE WEST OF SUEZ"
About a century ago a band of French utopians, known as Saint Simonists, proposed to regenerate the world, in part by constructing canals across the isthmuses of Suez and Panama. One of their number, Ferdinand de Lesseps, built the Suez waterway, but was imprisoned in the course of his unsuccessful attempt to put through a canal at Panama.
The Suez canal has been a gold mine for those fortunate enough to acquire shares in it. But, though the commerce and politics of a considerable section of the world have been radically altered by the hundred-mile stretch of waterway across Egypt, the world has not been regenerated as the Saint Simonists hoped it would be. Indeed, this same waterway is the one through which the unregenerate Dictator Mussolini is ferrying troops and munitions of war for the subjugation of the last independent kingdom in Africa.
Certain idealists accordingly propose that Great Britain nip in the bud this inexcusable war of plunder, by closing the Suez canal to Mussolini's military expedition. Thus far there has been no intimation of British governmental sympathy with this scheme—and for good reasons.
For, despite the popular impression to the contrary, Great Britain neither owns nor controls the Suez canal, which is the key to its all-important communications with India and other far-eastern parts of the empire. Disraeli, when he made that famous deal with the bankrupt Khedive, got only a seven-sixteenths ownership of the canal. That investment of less than \$20,000,000 paid Britain more than \$500,000,000 in dividends during the fifty-nine years, to say nothing of affording incalculable political benefits. But the French operate the canal. Its every official is a Frenchman. Every pilot is a Frenchman and only Frenchmen know the secret of the electric signalling system. Dues are paid to the French company, which takes its orders from the French minister in Cairo. Disputes must be settled in the French courts.
The French just now are at odds with the British for signing a separate naval agreement with the Germans and are very friendly with the Italians. They do not share Britain's moral indignation at Italy's proposed subjugation of Abyssinia. Therefore they would not voluntarily allow the British to stop the movement of Italian troops through the canal. Furthermore, they could point to the terms of the original concession and the Suez canal convention of 1888, which stipulates that the canal shall "always be free and open, in time of war as in time of peace, to every vessel of commerce or war, without distinction of flag."
So, if Italian aggression in Ethiopia is to be halted, it will have to be done "somewhere west of Suez."

CAN. LEGION CONVENTION OPENS AT CAMPBELLTON

CAMPBELLTON, N. B., July 22—The annual convention of the New Brunswick Command of the Canadian Legion opened here this morning with a large attendance of members from all over the province. Major W. C. Lawson, M. P. P., of Minto, was in the chair. The delegates were welcomed by Mayor P. W. Colwell and addresses were delivered by Hon. D. A. Stewart, former minister of Public Works, and by Hon. C. T. Richard, provincial secretary-treasurer.
A meeting of the provincial council was held last night at which reports were discussed and preparation of the agenda for the business session made. Brigadier Ross will speak at the banquet. He was accompanied by Brigadier-General McDonald, assistant chief pensions commissioner, Ottawa. They were welcomed upon their arrival by a number of local legion officials.
Speakers at the banquet will be Brigadier General A. Ross, Mr. Lawson and J. E. Michaud, K. C., of Edmundston, M. P. for Restigouche-Madawaska.

World Demand For Lamb
With reference to the increased consumption of lamb in Canada it is interesting to note that it is difficult to gauge the world consumption of lamb and mutton, owing to the absence of official data in several countries. Also, practically all producing countries many sheep, of which no record is available, are used for some consumption on the farm. New Zealand on an average in recent years has held first place as a consumer of lamb and mutton but her demand fluctuates widely from year to year. Australia, like Canada, is increasing her demand for lamb, which in 1932 was 50 per cent higher than in 1926. Great Britain's consumption has risen from 29 pounds per head in 1928 to 33 pounds in 1933. In that year also there was an increased consumption in Argentina, following reduced exports, due in a great measure to quota and tariff restrictions imposed by the chief European consuming countries, and also to the reduction of imports by the United Kingdom in consonance with the Ottawa Agreements. As to the country with the largest number of sheep, Australia is in the leading position, taking the place of the Soviet Union which until 1930 had the largest flocks of sheep in the world. From necessity, these flocks have been reduced by nearly two-thirds.

The Mail has succeeded in drawing the attention of the citizens to a number of things which are being run upside down. Many of these have been changed for the better by the influence of The Mail but you do not seem able to budge the city people so far as our dump goes.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Mabel O. Richards, wife of Daniel Richards, took place this afternoon with a very large number attending and the service being a most impressive one. The choir was present and sang the hymns, "Jesus Lover of My Soul", "Where the Light Forever Shinneth", and "Abide With Me", all favorites of the deceased. Very Rev. Dean Holmes paid eloquent tribute to Mrs. Richards and voiced the sentiments of all those present, that she would be greatly missed by all.

The inquest into the death of Jack Riley, Minto miner who lost his life on Friday afternoon, when the tunnel in which he was at work, in the Black Diamond Mine, was deluged with a slide of rock, will be held this evening in the Memorial Hall at Minto, commencing at eight o'clock. Alexander Burnett of Oromoct will act as coroner.

M. Gardner, Minto, who rendered first aid to Walsh and examined Riley.
