

MORE BEAUTY IN N. B. BRIDGES DESIGNERS' AIM

Will Try to Harmonize
Architecture With
Landscape

Two Completed

Gilmore and Adams
Bridges at Esdrael-
on are First

It is the intention of the department of public works to try in future to harmonize the architecture of new bridges with the surrounding landscape, it was announced today by R. A. Malloy, assistant bridge engineer. The first bridge of this sort is the Gilmore bridge, located at Esdraelon, on the road from Bristol to Millville, in Carleton County, which was recently completed and is now ready for traffic. Another in the same locality, the Adams bridge, is near completion. Much comment on the beauty of these bridges has been made by tourists, and it is the intention in future to design the bridges in such a way as to harmonize with the surrounding landscape. This will only be possible, Mr. Malloy said, when the required stone can be quarried near the scene of operations. The two bridges already completed are of unique Old World design, consisting of a rigid frame span 36 feet clear length with scabbled rubble masonry with stone and earth embankment approaches. They replace old wooden kingpost truss spans and greatly improve roadway alignment. The landscape in that particular part of the province is extraordinarily beautiful and these new bridges seen against a background of trees, a lake and an old dam materially to the natural beauty of the spot. These two bridges are the only ones of their type in the Maritime Provinces.

English Market Good
But Local Market
Better

Local Growers Compete
Successfully With
B. C. Apples

Although at present there is an extraordinarily heavy demand for New Brunswick apples in England it is not probable that local fruit growers will be able to take advantage of it, W. W. Hubbard, former president of the New Brunswick Fruit Growers' Association, announced this morning. A. G. Turney, of the New Brunswick Department of agriculture, who is in charge of the New Brunswick Apple Exchange on Regent street, where apples are now being boxed for the local market, stated today that he did not think growers in this district would bother with the English market, because they are getting a good price on the local market. It is possible that the growers in the Gagetown district will ship some apples to England in a few days, Mr. Turney said, but he thought that New Brunswick growers would, for the most part, continue to supply the local market as long as the present prices prevail. At present the growers are getting \$2.00 per box for fancy MacIntosh.

English Market
F. M. Sclanders, commissioner of the St. John Board of Trade, who received a cablegram recently from G. H. Ward, secretary of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce in London, saying that three cars weekly could be handled on consignment, communicated with Mr. Hubbard and George W. Dingle, Gagetown, president of the New Brunswick Fruit Growers' Association.

Mr. Hubbard explained that he did not think the local growers could take advantage of this market, pointing out that the local market was better this year and that only a few orchards would be able to ship anyway, owing to diseased orchards. He pointed out that the method of shipping on consignment was all right for the steady shipper, such as in Nova Scotia, but it was not always profitable for the small shippers. When a grower ships on consignment he is at the mercy of the market and is obliged to take the auction price for his fruit, Mr. Hubbard explained. He had received as low as seven cents per barrel for his apples in England by shipping in this manner and he said he knew of shippers, who had had to send money to pay the freight on their apples after they were sold over there.

Compete With B. C.
The apple crop in the province this year is below that of last year, causing a greater demand in the local market, Mr. Hubbard pointed out. He maintained that even if the growers wanted to ship they could not do so until the first of January, owing to the excessive freight rates to Montreal. They would have to wait for the port of St. John to open. Mr. Turney pointed out that at present an attempt was being made to compete with the British Columbia apples coming into the province, and was of the opinion that as long as the growers could compete successfully with these apples on the local market, they would not attempt to ship any to England.

Mr. VanDine welcomed the freshmen as a class—as a definite unit in college activities—and urged the first year students to get acquainted with themselves, and the institutions, organizations and societies of the University immediately, in order that they may more thoroughly take part in campus life.

The speaker went on to say that there would be two more such meetings held through the co-operation of the kindred societies, the Brunswickian, the U.N.B. Debating Society, and the U.N.B. Dramatic Society. At the next two meetings college sports will be discussed. The three get-together parties will be climaxed by the traditional Freshman reception, which later function will be immensely more enjoyable because of these previous meetings.

Following Mr. VanDine, Jack Thurtrott gave a brief outline of each Society, their organizations, histories and purposes.

The one-act play "A Pair of Lunatics," by W. R. Wakes, was then presented by the Dramatic Society. This play was first presented in Fredericton last spring with the same cast in the U.N.B. Theatrical. Miss Marjorie Matheson of Juniper, N. B., played the part of Clara Manners, and Ernest B. VanDine of Fredericton, enacted the role of Captain Jack Fielding. The Busted Scholarship, which was formerly given for third year mathematics, will be given this year for third year Economics, Dr. Jones announced. 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
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
