1935 SEASON

Quantity of Snow in the Woods, However, Will Interfere with Work

Same Regulations

Sunny Days and Cool Nights' Season Approaches.

The maple sugar season is fast approaching and with it the conditions so necessary for the running of sap from the maple trees, that is, warm sunny days and cool nights. It will be several weeks, however, before the season actually commences.

The abundance of snow which has fallen within the past several weeks will delay the season somewhat since the large quantity of snow will prevent the operators from going into the deep woods after the precious sap.

The usual regulations exist with respect to the bottling of maple syrup and as in other years each operator is required by law to properly wrap and tag every bottle he sells. The name of the producer and the quantity in the bottle is a requirement for the bottle label.

It is anticipated that the present season will be as successful as past seasons for the residents in this province are avid users of this delectable food syrup. There is a wide sale not only of the maple honey, but of the by-products, sugar and candy. Much of it is sold through the local market.

Most of the maple products are annually sold in this province and there is not an extensive market outside the province, though Quebec has taken quantities of syrup in some seasons. The price is dependent on supply and demand.

Earl Hickson, Fredericton Aviator, Here Over Weekend.

Need Airport Here

Local Aviator Engaged in Passenger Service in St. Lawrence Area

Earl Hickson, who won his spurs as an accomplished flyer at Camp Borden and who has been engaged in numerous enterprises in recent years, arrived here in a Fairchild plane on Saturday afternoon from Montane, Quebec, making the trip in one hour and fifty minutes. He spent the weekend with his mother, Mrs. Robert Hickson, Charlotte street and left at ten o'clock this morning on the return flight. Mr. Hickson arrived here unaccompanied but took back with him, Nairn McCaffrey and Mrs. Frank Shute.

The Fredericton aviator expressed the opinion while here that the capital is certainly behind the times so far as facilities for looking after plane transports go. It is one of the few places in Eastern Canada which is not equipped with an airport. Mr. Hickson says that every little town in Quebec and Upper Canada has either an airport or facilities for taking care of visiting aircraft. "A pilot," he said, "is uncertain as to whether to make the trip here or not, because he doesn't know whether its possible to land or not." Such a pre-


