DATES FOR THE ALLAN CUP PLAYDOWNS

OTTAWA, Feb. 27—Cecil Duncan, vice-president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, has announced dates for Eastern Canada games in the Allan and Memorial Cup elimination series. The dates of the Allan Cup series:

Series "A" Ottawa district against O. H. A. winners; first game at Toronto March 21; second game at Ottawa March 23.

Series "B" winner of series "A" against Quebec branch winners, first game at Montreal March 25; second game at Toronto March 27.

Series "C" Eastern final: March 30 and April 1; winner of series "B" against Maritime branch champions; both games in Maritimes.

All series will be two out of three games with the point system in effect. Victories will count two points, ties one point. All games must be played overtime for a maximum of 30 minutes when the score is tied at the end of the regular three periods.

If each team wins one game the third game will be played on the same ice as the second. In the event of a third game being necessary the dates will be automatically changed.

Memorial Cup junior series dates: Series "A" March 19 and March 21; Maritimes Branch winner against Ottawa District winners; both games at Ottawa.

Series "B" O. H. A. winners against Quebec branch winners; first game at Montreal March 22, second game at Toronto March 25.

Series "C" Eastern final, March 27 and March 29; winner of series "A" against winner of series "B". If the Maritime branch winners win series "A" both games will be played at Montreal or Toronto depending on the winner of series "B." If Ottawa district wins series "A" the first game at Montreal or Toronto March 29.

The point system and rules for this series will be the same as those for the Allan Cup games.

1940 Olympics Are Planned For

OSLO, Norway, Feb. 27—The question of where the 1940 Olympic Games will be held today was put over until tomorrow for decision as the International Olympic Committee began its sessions.

King Gustav, Prince Olav, other Norwegian officials and members of the diplomatic corps were present for the formal opening. The Japanese ambassador, Sigimura, said Mussolini had promised his country Italy would drop its demand that the 1940 games be held in Rome, but Count Boacossa, the Italian delegate, said Mussolini's remarks had been misunderstood and that Italy still was a candidate as host for the games.

Finland is a third aspirant for the honor of entertaining the world's athletes.

The 1936 Olympics will be held in Berlin.
