Royal Wedding In November or December

DUMFRIES, Scotland, Sept. 6—Lady Alice Christabel Montagu-Douglas-Scott, the fiancée of the Duke of Gloucester, third son of Their Majesties, has revealed the tale soldier Prince had proposed three weeks ago.

The pale, brown-eyed daughter of the Duke and Duchess of Buccleugh and Queensberry, presently at Drumlanrig Castle which the family uses each autumn as a shooting lodge, said:

"No, I shall not say where I was. All I will say is it was three weeks ago."

She insisted the date for the wedding has not been set. It was recalled, however, Royal engagements normally run about three months, leading to the expectation the ceremony be performed late in November or early in December.

BENNETT'S WHEAT POLICY ASSAILED

BELLEVEILLE, Ontario, Sept. 6—Condemning the wheat policy of Premier Bennett, which he claimed was costing Canada some \$2,000,000 a month in storage charges alone, Premier J. G. Gardiner, of Saskatchewan believes a concerted effort should be made to market the grain surplus.

"We must sell our goods in the markets of the world," he stated at a Liberal gathering here last night. "The Liberal Party will welcome trade with other countries and start the wheels of industry spinning once again."
