Statement

National revenue collections for the  
port of Fredericton for July amounts  
to \$38,508.62, according to a statement  
given out this morning by F. P. Colter,  
collector of National Revenue for this  
port.

The amount is actually a decrease  
of \$12,438.46 over the corresponding  
month of July 1934, when the collec-  
tions amounted to \$50,947.08.

oritative Report

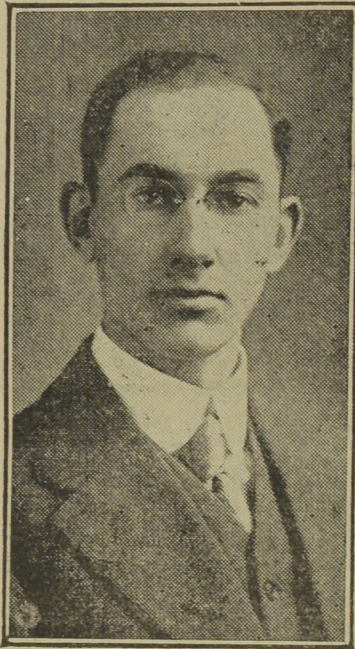
### Other Changes

Deputy Atty-General  
Clerk of Exec. Council  
Offices Combined

It is stated today on good authority  
that J. B. Dickson, barrister of this  
city, has been appointed deputy attor-  
ney-general, and clerk of the executive  
council. This is a new position, or  
rather the amalgamation of two other  
positions. Mr. Dickson replaces R.  
P. Hartley, K. C., as deputy attorney-  
general, and H. Lester Smith as clerk  
of the executive council. Mr. Smith  
goes down to the Attorney-General's  
department as deputy registrar of the  
Supreme Court in place of R. S. Stev-  
enson, who retires from the service.  
This is an amalgamation of duties to  
a certain extent and a possible saving  
of salaries.

The change in the Attorney-General's  
Department was forecasted in  
The Daily Mail some days ago.

At noon today Premier Dwyer stated  
to a representative of The Daily  
Mail that he had nothing to give out  
in regard to appointments. Hon. J.

B. McNair, K.C., attorney-general in  
whose department the changes are re-  
corded absolutely refused to commit  
himself. H. Lester Smith, clerk of the  
executive council, and J. Bacon Dick-  
son, who was actually on duty at the  
executive council this morning, de-  
clined to discuss the matter but The  
Daily Mail as usual and as was the  
case last week in the matter of the  
resignation of B. H. Kinghorn, likes  
to give the public the news at the  
earliest opportunity. It is also stat-  
ed that Henry Wishart who is employ-  
ed as mail carrier and assistant care-  
taker has been asked to resign from  
the position. We have not yet learn-  
ed the name of his successor. Speak-  
ing to The Daily Mail at noon Hon.  
Mr. Dwyer said that he as head of the  
Public Works Department had abso-  
lutely no knowledge of Mr. Wishart's  
dismissal. Mr. Wishart says he receiv-  
ed a letter regarding the matter. There  
are other changes including some at  
the Motor Vehicle branch uptown and  
a few in the departmental buildings,  
which are yet to be announced. It  
is probable that the premier or the  
heads of the other departments, will  
have further information in a few  
days.

the sale of \$1,358,000 provincial 3 per  
cent debentures. The issue has been  
sold to refund debentures amounting  
to \$782,000 which matured on July 2nd  
last, and the balance to apply on  
floating indebtedness recorded at the  
end of the fiscal year of \$576,000.
