FOUR LIBERALS DECLARED ELECTED IN YORK COUNTY

Today was Declaration Day in York County in connection with last Thursday's provincial election. Informal proceedings were held this morning at the county court house when Sheriff Roy W. Smith returning officer, gave out final and exact returns on the balloting for the York County candidates. All figures on the ballot boxes were checked up and there was found to be no unusual occurrences in conjunction with polling.

The four liberal candidates were formally declared elected today. The totals were as follows: S. E. Durling (Liberal) 8,953; Alderman H. Ralph Gunter (Liberal) 8,962; J. B. McNair (Liberal) 9,035; Ernest W. Stairs (Liberal) 9,013; Dr. B. H. Dougan (Conservative) 7,379; Dr. M. L. Jewett (Conservative) 7,256; Alderman C. Hedley Forbes (Conservative) 7,310; Donald P. Douglass (Conservative) 7,292.

Sheriff Roy Smith stated today that the final checkup took in the box at Barker's Point which had been left out previously and also the results of the advance polls. There was very little difference in the ultimate result.

Council Objects To Paying for Signal

"house dogs" should not be taxed. Moved by Coun. Saunders and seconded by Coun. Manuel that the pay of valuator be set at \$5 per day and that the valuator pay their own expenses.

Coun. Dougherty and Griffin were of the opinion that a uniform rate of pay should be set by the council for the valuator and assessors. Coun. Morrison thought that the assessors could get by on \$4 per day, but the valuator should be at least \$5 a day, because they have more travelling and work to do.

Coun. Coburn made an amendment to the motion to the effect that the valuator receive only \$4 per day and pay their own expenses rather than \$5 per day and pay their own expenses. The amendment was seconded by Coun. Doherty and carried.

Major John S. Scott

Major John S. Scott, secretary-treasurer, who was called in to explain the order in council for the installation of the wig-wag signal of the C.P.R. crossing at Harvey Station. explained that the order in council ordered that the county pay one half of the maintenance of the sign. According to correspondence received by Major Scott pertaining to the matter the county had to pay for a trip made by a C.P.R. repair man who worked at repairing the sign on a public holiday when he received double time for his services. Major Scott explained that the Board of Railway commissioners have the upper hand on the public safety. He suggested that the county solicitor take it up with the Board of Railway Commissioners. Warden Traynor was of the opinion that the bill should not be paid.

Committee

Coun. Barry moved that a committee be appointed to investigate the matter. It was seconded by Coun. Waugh and carried. The committee was appointed as follows: Councillors Coburn, Waugh and Barry.

It was moved and seconded that Warden Gaynor be granted leave of absence for the afternoon and also that the council visit the Municipal Home this afternoon. The motions were carried.

Coun. Wright moved that Kenneth Campbell, architect, be invited to visit the Home with the Council this afternoon. It was seconded by Coun. Wright and adopted. Mr. Campbell will inspect the building to consider the possibility of remodelling the Home for the purpose of separating the old inmates from the children.

Assessors' Wages

Coun. Bird S. Briggs suggested that the question of pay for the assessors be considered and that a uniform rate be paid throughout the county.

Coun. Morrison moved that the pay be set at \$4 on the assessors. Coun. Manuel moved an amendment to the effect that each parish set its own pay. Coun. Dougherty moved an amendment that they be paid \$3 a day.

Coun. Robinson was of the opinion that the county did not have authority to set the wages of parish assessors.

Coun. George W. Estey, Bright thought that the parish should have the right to set the pay of assessors when the parish was paying for their services.

Coun. Dougherty's motion that the pay of parish assessors for county purposes be set at \$3 a day and pay their own expenses, was defeated.

On motion by Coun. Manuel and seconded by Coun. Griffin it was resolved to leave the setting of the assessors' pay to the parishes.

On motion by Councillor Saunders and seconded by Coun. Graham it was decided that the council meet at 2.30 p.m. A.D.S.T. for the purpose of visiting the Municipal Home.

The Council adjourned to 3 p.m. A.D.S.T.

FIRES CONTROLLED

It was reported today from the office of the chief forester, G. L. Miller, that the two outbreaks of forest fires which occurred yesterday in the province, one in Gloucester and the other in Northumberland county, are now under complete control. However crews of men are still at work, ready to check any further outbreak. The forests are becoming dryer now and all precaution is being taken against outbreaks of fire in the particularly dangerous sections.

HAS A SON HERE

The news of the death at Saint John of William Henry Bell, aged 80 years, was learned here today with considerable regret. The late W. H. Bell was one of the first to be connected with the introduction of sewing machines into this province. He had been engaged for fifty-five years in active merchandising. Besides his connection with the sewing machine business, deceased was an adherent and supporter of the Baptist Church and was a member of New Brunswick Lodge F. and A. M., and of the Scottish Rite as far as the Rose Croix degree. He was born in this city the son of William D. and Margaret Bell, of Old Country stock. Relatives include a son, Dr. George K. Bell of this city. Other relatives are as follows: Frank S. Bell, of Saint John, associated with his father all his business life; Dr. E. H. three quarts of milk or more daily the price shall be cents per quart.
The minimum wholesale and retail prices for milk sold in the Chatham area shall be as follows:
Quarts: retail 8c., wholesale, 6c.
Pints: retail 4c., wholesale 3c.
Half-pints: retail, 2c.
The minimum wholesale and retail prices for milk sold in the Fredericton area shall be as follows:
Quarts: retail 10c., wholesale 8c.
Pints: retail 5c., wholesale 4c.
Half-pints: retail 3c., wholesale 2½c.
The minimum wholesale and retail prices for milk sold in the Saint John area shall be as follows:
Gallons: wholesale 36c., minimum quantity two gallons in can.
Quarts: retail 12c., wholesale 10c.
Pints: retail 6c., wholesale 5c.
Half-pints: retail 4c., wholesale 3c.
The minimum retail delivered price for milk in containers in the Sussex area shall be 8c. per quart.
The minimum retail price for milk sold in bulk from stores shall be 7c. per quart.
