Moncton, Chatham St. John, Sussex, F'ton Come Under Act

Order is Gazetted

Wholesale, Retail Prices For Milk Cream, Etc. Made Uniform

The New Brunswick Dairy Products Commission after an investigation in recent months, has decreed that on and after July 15, new regulations and prices for milk and cream and other dairy products shall be effective in five areas of the province.

According to the Royal Gazette the Dairy Products Commission had received a petition containing signatures in excess of two-thirds of the qualified petitioners to have this Act put into force in the above named areas.

The new regulations will mean uniform prices for milk and cream and other dairy products. Minimum and maximum prices have been laid down by the order.

Milk Prices

For the various areas the following are the minimum prices to be paid for milk:

The minimum wholesale and retail prices for milk sold in the Moncton Area shall be as follows:

Quarts: retail 10c., wholesale 8c. Pints: retail, 6c., wholesale 5c.

Half-pints: retail 3c., wholesale 2 1/2c

COUNTY COUNCIL OBJECTS TO PAYING FOR C.P.R. SAFETY SIGNAL AT HARVEY STATION

Committee Appointed To Look Into Matter—The Boards of Assessors and Valuator To Confer Friday To Set Valuation For County—Valuator's Wages Reduced—Assessors' Wages To Be Set by Parishes — Visit Municipal Home This Afternoon.

A committee to investigate an order in Council passed by the government and compelling the county to pay one half the maintenance cost of a "wig-wag" signal on the C.P.R. crossing at Harvey, was appointed at this morning's session of the York County Council, after considerable discussion concerning the advisability of the county paying the bill when they had no consideration in the passing of the order in Council.

It was also decided at this morning's session that all the boards of assessors in the county will be asked to confer with the county board of valuator on Friday next to determine a new valuation in the county. The last valuation was made in 1925 and is usually determined every ten years.

After much discussion the wages of parish valuator's and assessors for county purposes were reduced. The valuator's wages were reduced from \$5 per day to \$4 per day, the valuator's paying their own expenses, while the setting of the assessors' wage was left to the parishes.

The Council adjourned to 2.00 p.m., A.D.S.T. when they will visit the Municipal Home in Douglas.

Secretary-Treasurer's Accounts

Councillor Barry in speaking of the Secretary Treasurer's Accounts, remarked that there were accounts referring to "wig-wag" signals for the C. P. R. crossing at Harvey. He said that the secretary treasurer told him there was an order in council compelling the county to pay for these signs. He suggested that the matter be taken up to find out if an order in council could be put through compelling the county to pay for it without the Council's consent.

Councillor Frank Coburn, Harvey stated that he did not see why they should pay for the maintenance of the sign, when it does its work without any need of repair.

Councillor S. G. Wright, Canterbury was of the opinion that the county should not be bound alone to protect the public of the whole province. "If an order in council is to be passed over on the county without the consent of the council something should be done about it," he said.

Councillor Newton Dunphy, Douglas remarked that if some action was not taken by the council the county would have more bills of this kind to pay. He thought that an order in council applied to the province, but not to the county. "Therefore it should not apply to the county," he added.

Councillor Wright again voiced the opinion that there was no reason why the county should pay for the repairs to the sign. He thought that the full cost of the sign would eventually be put on the county.

Warden Gaynor asked who sanctioned the payment of the bill. He thought that it should not have been paid without the sanction of the district. He pointed out that the C.P.R. paid for the one at McAdam, and he could not understand why the county should have to pay for the one at Harvey.

Valuation

Moved by Councillor Morrison that trucks, tractors and automobiles be deleted from the county tax form. The motion was seconded by Sterling Whitehead, Queensbury, and carried.

Coun. Dougherty moved that all the chairmen of the boards of assessors be asked to meet with the county board of valuator to determine a new valuation in the county. Coun. Frank Saunders, Prince William, seconded the motion and it was carried. The conference will take place on Friday next.

Valuator's Wages

Coun. Robinson, Keswick, moved that the question of levying taxes on all dogs be taken up by the council tomorrow morning. Seconded by Coun. Hiram Manuel, Hawkshaw, and carried. Coun. Robinson stated that some people seemed to think that

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HOUSE BURNED TO GROUND AT PENNIAC TODAY

Home of Bernard Bulger Went Up in Flames Early Today

Cause Unknown

Neighbors, Firefighters Assisted at Scene of the Blaze

The house owned and occupied by Bernard Bulger at Penniac was burned to the ground in a fire which broke out at 6:30 o'clock this morning, and the cause of which was still not ascertained this afternoon.

The Bulger house was familiarly known as the "old Jim Gibson home" and is situated on the bank of the river near the station. The Bulger family, assisted by neighbors were able to save most of the furniture, and also the adjacent barn. The fire is believed to have started somewhere near the top of the house, probably on the roof. The fire was first discovered breaking through the roof.

Volunteer firemen from Penniac and also members of the Marysville fire department assisted in fighting the fire but all to no avail. It is understood that Mr. Bulger had his home covered with insurance. There were no casualties.
