**SOCIAL HAPPENINGS**Canada's women today made a  
Gesture of Farewell to the Countess  
of Bessborough and her three chil-  
dren, one of them a Canadian, in a  
presentation ceremony at Government  
House where they were represented  
by Lady Perley and members of the  
National Committee for the Lady  
Bessborough gift fund.Lady Perley, wife of Sir George  
Perley, presented Her Excellency  
with a gold cup 16 1/4 inches high  
bearing the inscription: "Her Excel-  
lency, the Countess of Bessborough,  
from the Women of Canada, 1931-  
1935". To Their Excellencies' chil-  
dren she presented watches, white  
gold ones for Lord Duncannon and  
Hon. George St. Lawrence Neufville  
Ponsonby, and a diamond bracelet one  
for Lady Moyra Ponsonby.In her address to the Countess,  
Lady Perley said: "Our only regret  
is that this is a farewell gift, for your  
charming personality had endeared  
you to all those who have had the  
honor of meeting you".She then asked permission to pre-  
sent the watches to the younger mem-  
bers of the Vice-Regal family and  
added: "We hope the gifts will serve  
as a pleasant reminder of the years  
you have spent among us".With the cup Lady Perley handed  
Her Excellency a book bound in Royal  
Blue Morocco embossed with gold  
and, like the cup, bearing the Cana-dian coat of arms. On the leaves  
of the book are recorded the names  
of members of the national committee  
for the gift fund and those of more  
than 1,500 women and women's orga-  
nizations contributing to the fund.In her speech of acceptance the  
Countess said: "I do not need any  
reminder of our happy years in Can-  
ada. The kindness and friendliness  
of the welcome we received all over  
the Dominion will always be a most  
treasured memory, but in this magni-  
ficent present, which I shall think of  
always as a loving cup, I see the final  
proof of the affection the women of  
Canada have always shown to me.  
This affection I reciprocate most truly  
and I always feel that I am one of you,  
being a Canadian mother".(This was a reference to the birth  
August 14, 1931, of Hon. George Pon-  
sonby).She expressed thanks also for the  
gifts to her children who, she said,  
"have wonderful memories of Cana-  
da".

Lord Duncannon, the Governor-Gen-  
eral's elder son, made an impromptu  
speech today before a gathering of  
women who went to Government  
House with Lady Perley to present  
the Countess of Bessborough and her  
three children with farewell gifts,  
council during last week.Lord Duncannon, Lady Moyra, and  
Hon. George Ponsonby, the four-year-  
old baby of the Vice-Regal family,  
were given watches. Lord Duncannon  
thanked Lady Perley and said: "Geor-  
ge and I have always had a weak-  
ness for the fair sex and we shall  
have it more than ever following the  
gifts of these beautiful watches".

Plans were disclosed today for an  
official public farewell by the Domi-  
nion Government to the Governor-Gen-  
eral and Countess of Bessborough  
when they entrain on Thursday for  
Montreal enroute for England. Their  
Excellencies will leave Government  
House with an escort of the Princess  
Louise Dragoon Guards while Boy  
Scouts and Girl Guides will line the  
drive at Rideau Hall grounds. At the  
station the corridors will be lined by  
the Cameron Highlanders of Ottawa  
and in the general waiting room will  
be a guard of honor of the Governor-  
General's Foot Guards. The Royal  
Salute will be given by the Guard of  
Honor and at the same time a salute  
of 19 guns will be fired from Parlia-  
ment Hill by the First Field Brigade,  
Canadian Artillery. The Governor-  
General will review the Guard before  
proceeding to the train. Their Excel-  
lencies will spend Friday in Montreal  
and part of Saturday in Quebec.
