

## ASSASSIN'S WEAPON DEAF GIRL LEARNS HAS KILLED MANY TO SPEAK WHEN 18

Some Serious Crises Have Resulted From Deaths of World Figures.

The assassin's weapon has struck down many a notable political figure and caused serious crises.

An assassin fired the tinder that roared into the World War conflagration; Archduke Ferdinand of Austria-Hungary and his wife, Countess Sophie, were slain June 28, 1914, at Sarajevo, Bosnia, by Gavrilo Princip, a Yugoslavi student.

Canada's only political assassination occurred April 7, 1868, when Thomas d'Arcy McGee, an Irish-Canadian member of the Dominion cabinet was shot in an Ottawa street by a Seinn Felner.

Many crowned heads, struck down by political killers, included: Abdul Aziz, Sultan of Turkey, June 17, 1876; Czar Alexander II of Russia, March 13, 1881; Nasr-Eddin, Shah of Persia, May 1, 1896; Empress Elizabeth of Austria, Feb. 18 1898; King Humbert of Italy July 29, 1899; Alexander and Draga of Serbia, June 11, 1903; King Carlos of Portugal and Crown Princess Louise Philippe, Feb. 1, 1908; Prince Ito of Japan, Oct. 26, 1909; King George of Greece, March 18, 1913; Czar Nicholas of Russia and his family, July 14, 1918; Nadir Shah, of Afghanistan, July 14, 1933.

At Marseille

King Alexander of Yugoslavia was killed by an assassin's bullet at Marseille, October 9, 1934. Louis Barthou, foreign minister of France, was fatally wounded in the same fusillade.

Presidents, premiers and dictators, have bowed before bullets, bombs and dirks.

Engelbert Dollfuss, Chancellor of Austria was trapped and slain by Nazis July 25, 1934, in an abortive putsch.

Ion G. Duca, premier of Rumania, was killed Dec. 29, 1933, Dr. Walter Rathenau, German foreign minister, was slain June 24, 1922.

In United States

Three presidents of the United States succumbed to killers' bullets: Abraham Lincoln, April 15, 1864; James A. Garfield, September 19, 1881; and William McKinley, September 14, 1901.

Assassins failed in attempts upon the lives of President Theodore Roosevelt, wounded in Buffalo, and of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, the target of Giuseppe Zangara, on February 15, 1933 at Miami, Fla.

The bullet intended for Franklin D. Roosevelt struck Mayor Anton J. Cermak of Chicago, who died March 6 of his wound.

Similar Afflicted Children Are Taught To Dance to Piano Says Teacher.

CALGARY, Alberta, Sept. 20—For seven generations Miss Dena Hagen's family has been active in working for deaf people and today Miss Hagen finds the urge no less strong than it was in her great-great-uncle, who was Canada's first teacher for the deaf. She visited Calgary on a vacation from the School for Deaf at Saskatoon where she is a teacher.

The school has 140 pupils ranging from 5 to 13 years. They are first taught to speak, after which the whole process of thought must be unravelled for them, Miss Hagen said. Sign and lip reading is taught and then regular academic and vocational curriculum follows. Manual training, household science, shoe repairing and bakery business are some of the vocations in which instruction is given.

Miss Hagen explained completely deaf children are taught to dance in perfect time to a piano, yet they have no cue to the rhythm other than vibrations felt through the floor.

One deaf girl at the Saskatoon school learned to speak at 18, and so expressed her thoughts for the first time in her life. She graduated, Miss Hagen said with pride, and this fall is going to Gallaudet, Washington the only college in the world for deaf people.

Scientific research is carried on at the Saskatoon school and the latest ideas on teaching the deaf are put into practice as they are developed. In addition, normal school training classes for teachers for the deaf are held and the five teachers at the school are all "home trained."

Miss Hagen is the first Canadian college graduate—she has her degree from McMaster University, Hamilton, Ontario,—to take a normal training course at Gallaudet college. Mr James Watson, an uncle of Miss Hagen's started the school for the deaf in Winnipeg.
