Radio Oddities

For many years Ruth Carhart of Ellsworth, Kan., has studied to follow in her mother's footsteps as a concert singer. She majored in music during her four college years, studied under Mme. Schumann-Heink on a scholarship, studied at the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music, and is in her fourth year at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia, where she went as a scholarship student on the recommendation of Fritz Reher, noted maestro. She made her debut on the CBS "Roxey and His Gang" program recently and the impresario introduced her as "one of the most important discoveries of my career," with "the greatest potentialities of any artist that ever worked for me." It is not, however, as a concert artist that Roxey has prophesied such brilliant success, but as a blues singer.

"No dogs allowed," an unwritten law, is usually as sternly enforced at the CBS Radio Playhouses as the much visible "No Smoking" ukases. One canine exception to the "no dog" rules is "Rowdy," the grey miniature schnauzer who is Lucretia Bori's pet and constant companion. "Rowdy" is allowed backstage at the 44th Street CBS Playhouse, and during the programs he sits silently and discreetly in the opera star's dressing room until the broadcast is over.

The school days of Jimmy Tansey, the "Danny" of the CBS script family, "The O'Neills," were just about as widely scattered and inter-scholastic as anyone could boast. Growing up in a theatrical family, Jimmy attended 23 schools in 15 states.

Colorful Beaux-Arts Ball To Be Scene of CBS Broadcast

One of the most lavish public functions staged in America—the Beaux-Arts Ball sponsored by the Society of Beaux-Arts Architects,—will be heard over the Columbia-WABC network on the night tonight, from 1:30 to 1:45 A. M., A. S. T.

The 1935 ball will be held in the grand ballroom of the Waldorf-Astoria hotel, and will have a historical background of the Regency in Great Britain. The title of the pageant this year—"George III Regrets"—reflects the fact that the British monarch was not on speaking terms with his son, the Prince of Wales, and refused consistently to attend any of the elaborate entertainments the Prince gave both in London and in Brighton.

A feature of the CBS broadcast will be an interview with Emil Alvin Hartman, a director of the Fashion Academy and an authority on fashions. He will discuss the Regency period and its effect on modern styles.

The Beaux-Arts ball, presented 15 times since 1913, this year is expected to draw 5,000 guests, all of whom will be required to dress in the costumes of the Regency period.

LILLIE TO TRY FOR "SCOOP" OVER GROUND HOG

Beatrice Lillie, Comedienne, to Make Forecast Regardless of the Shadow—To Sing "Mad Dogs and Englishmen"

Beatrice Lillie's famous version of Noel Coward's satirical song, "Mad Dogs and Englishmen" and special Ground Hog Eve ceremonies will be the features of her program with Lee Perrin's orchestra and the Cavaliers over the nationwide NBC-WJZ network tonight at 10:00 P. M., A. S. T. The titled comedienne will also involve herself in the problem of mid-year examinations which are currently harrasing the nation's schoolchildren. Her troubles will begin when Cousin Junior drops in. "Bee" will attempt to "scoop" the Ground Hog, who is scheduled to make to make his first appearance of the year on the following day. If she sees her shadow, the chances are that it will not make any difference. She has been forecasting years, and never once has she been right. "Mad Dogs and Englishmen" is one of Miss Lillie's most successful stage numbers. It is a sharp satire of the hardy Britishers and their colonial activities. While all others escape the burning tropical sun during the middle of the day, it seems that only canines and the English attempt to brave it.

The comedienne is well qualified to give advice on school examinations being an old flunker. Her academic training was gained in a Toronto public school, where another student was Mary Smith, who later became fairly well known as Mary Pickford, and at St. Agnes' College.

FILM STARS TO BE HEARD IN BROADCAST

Edward G. Robinson, of the movies, and Jean Arthur lovely star of stage and screen will be heard as guest stars of Louella Parsons during the broadcast of "Hollywood Hotel", dramatic musical revue over the nationwide WABC-Columbia network from 10:30 to 11:30 P. M., A. S. T. tonight Robinson and Miss Arthur will appear in excerpts from their recent picture "The Whole Town's Talking".

Dick Powell, master-of-ceremonies will be heard singing "The Words Are In My Heart", and will join Frances Langford in a new number entitled "I'm Going Shopping With You". Miss Langford will then sing "Lullaby of Broadway".

Other performers who will assist in making "Hollywood Hotel" a gay spot to visit include Muzzy Marcellino Candy, the Debutantes trio, a girl quintette built around the Debutantes and Ted Fio-Rito and his orchestra.

Pro Arte Group to Feature 4 Beethoven Quartets from Opus 18

The Pro Arte String Quartet of Brussels, presented by the Columbia Broadcasting System through the courtesy of Mrs. Elizabeth Sprague Coolidge, will offer four early quartets by Ludwig van Beethoven in successive concerts today, and Saturday, February 2, from 5:15 to 6:00 P. M., A. S. T. The famous Belgian ensemble will play in the Auditorium of the Library of Congress in Washington, D. C.

The Friday afternoon concert will feature the D major quartet, No. 3, and the C minor quartet, No. 4, from Opus 18. The Saturday afternoon broadcast will include the A major quartet, No. 5, and the B flat major quartet, No. 6, also from Opus 18. These quartets from Opus 18, first published in Vienna in 1801, are the most representative products of Beethoven's first period. All of them originated in the years 1798 to 1801, one of the most successful periods—certainly the happiest—of Beethoven's life. These quartets quickly became favorite works at the many private concerts held in Viennese homes, for public performances of chamber music occurred very rarely in these days. All of these works were dedicated to Prince Franz Josef Max Lobkowitz, numbered among the most prominent of Beethoven's friends and protectors. The Prince was an able violinist and it was in his home that many of Beethoven's instrumental compositions were first performed.

The Pro Arte String Quartet, a world-famous organization in the field of chamber music, consists of A. Onnou, first violinist; L. Halleux, second violinist; G. Prevost, viola; and R. Mass, cellist.

The real name of Cliff Soubier endman of the Sinclair Minstrels heard from the Chicago studios of NBC, is Sourbeer. He was born in Hamilton, Ontario, where neighboring families rejoiced in the names of Staleale and Sourwine.

Heard in the NBC studios: An admirer once sent Jessica Dragonette an autographed photograph of a parrot. The bird's foot was dipped in ink to register the footprint on the photo. . . . Bern Bernie boasts that a cigar hasn't touched his lips in year. He uses a cigar holder. . . . Mildred Bailey loves Chinese dishes. . . . Frank Parker made his first dollar posing for an artist as a cherub. It is only fair to add he was a babe in arms at the time.

They will feature "Rock and Roll", a medley including "You're the Top", "After You", "She Didn't Say Yes", "Try to Forget", and "I'm Wild About Harry", and the gay tune "Continent-al". Special arrangements of Drigo's "Serenade", "Old Faithful", the lively Mexican number, "La Cucaracha", will be played by the orchestra, and the entire ensemble will join in singing as the finale, "Wild Honey".

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
