Many Combine Hunting  
and Fishing  
Trips

The streams of New Brunswick this year have enjoyed the best run of salmon and the greatest patronage of non-resident fishermen during the month of September than in any previous September in the history of salmon fishing in the province. It was announced today by Bill Griffin, president of the New Brunswick Guides Association. The salmon season which closes in most streams on Monday has been unusually good for this time of year and many non-resident fishermen have taken advantage of the new non-resident hunting license to combine fishing and hunting in one trip. On Monday the salmon fishing season in this province closes on all streams except the Nashwaak, Cains River and Tabusintac.

Dr. John Stickle, New York, and Henry Bradford, Bennington, Vt., have just returned from a successful fishing and hunting trip on the Cain's River where they bagged ten salmon, eighteen grise and two deer under the guidance of Allen and Wade, well known guides. This was Mr. Bradford's second trip and he attributed his zeal to the hunting and fishing in New Brunswick to the new special non-resident license, allowing the holder to take two deer and two bear for a fee of ten dollars, inaugurated this year by Hon. F. W. Pirie, minister of lands and mines. Formerly this license cost \$25.

Al Seaver, passenger traffic agent for the New York and New Haven Railway, who returned here with Mrs. Seaver last night after a two weeks fishing trip to Cain's River, reported that the salmon are plentiful.

MAN POSSESSES  
ANCIENT LETTER

Letter Said to Have  
Been Written 663  
Years Ago

Robert Bruce Author

On Back of Shingle  
Bearing Fullarton  
Clan Insignia

Alexander D. Fullarton, Williamsburg, York County, is the proud possessor of a letter said to have been written in the 13th century by Robert Bruce, pretender to the throne of Scotland in 1286. The letter is pasted on the back of a shingle bearing the armorial insignia of the clan of Fullarton, and is said to have been written by Bruce and presented to the leader of the clan in recognition of services rendered by the clan in battle. The insignia and letter are said to have been presented by Bruce in the year 1272 A. D., when he was recognized in Scotland as king.

663 Years Old

The arms of the clan are on the front of the shingle to which they were apparently stuck when presented and are still very clear. The written account which accompanied them is attached to the back of the shingle and is much faded, it being hard for readers today to follow the trend. Much of the latter part of the message has been completely lost. It is obvious, however, from that which is legible, that the king is praising one "reginald fullarton," (the words are not capitalized in the account following the custom of the time) for his deeds in battle, though it is not clear whether the fighting was done in a war or in one of the clan feuds which were frequent at that time. The date 1272 is clear. The document originally ran, probably, 150 to 250 words in length, and the writing, supposed to be that of the famed Bruce, although easy to read originally would be called not much better than a "schoolboy" hand today.

Silver Cup

A cup of silver lined with gold was also presented at the time of the presentation of the shingle. It is also in the possession of Mr. Fullarton. It is about three inches high and is perfectly plain save for the arms of the family which are engraved on the front.

These two trophies of an age long past have been handed down from generation to generation in the Fullarton family, and first came to this country when the late Donald Fullarton, father of the present owner, brought them with him from Scotland. Little is known in the family about the details surrounding their presentation, save for the fact that family tradition says it was presented by Robert Bruce and was for valor shown in a war and not in a clan feud. The name of Bruce does not appear on the document mentioned although the tone of the missive suggests that the presentation is being made by someone in high authority.

Armorial Ensign

The armorial ensign of the family consists of a shield crowned by the mailed bust of a warrior and above that a camel's head. A garland of white roses is at one side of the shield and one of very faded pink roses at the other. Beneath the shield is a scroll bearing the words "Lux in tenebris." Above all are the words "The Armorial Ensign of the Name of Fullarton." The words "camel's head" appear in the writing on the back of the shingle but the next few words are illegible and the significance is lost.

Young Bull Moose  
Dies From Exposure  
Mired in Mud Hole

A three-year-old bull moose died yesterday morning from exposure after being mired in a mud hole back of the farm of Jack Stevens, Stevens' Lake. The moose which was rescued Tuesday by Mr. Stevens and officials of the New Brunswick Game Dept., although given the best treatment by those in charge of it, succumbed yesterday from the effects of its unfortunate experience. It is not known how long the animal had been mired before it was discovered by Mr. Stevens, but it is thought that it must have been there for several days. This is the 2nd moose that has died in the same way, and it is the intention of the game department to take all precautions to prevent a recurrence of the incident, it was announced by Col. H. H. Ritchie, chief game warden.

Sunbury County  
Municipal Election

The County of Sunbury will hold a municipal election to elect councillors for five of the seven parishes in the county on October 1st. 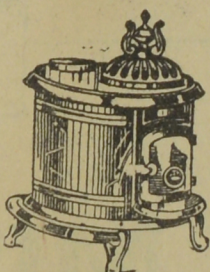
