A Busy Meeting

Mayor McEvoy Presides  
At Devon Council's  
Regular Meeting

The township of Devon is undertaking a drive on delinquent tax payers and in this connection employed Alex. Murray, of this city, as a special collector to interview those in arrears and make an effort to have all back taxes collected.

Ordinarily taxes were collected from the office of the town clerk but the council in its regular monthly session last night decided on departure as outlined above. The meeting was a busy one, with Mayor A. J. McEvoy presiding and the other aldermen present being Henry, Boone, Dobie, Ladds, Ashfield, Bailey, Young and Flower. Bills and accounts were passed.

Direct relief for the past month was less than in the previous month, it was reported. Ald. Henry reported on the roads and streets, which are in as good condition as can be expected for the period of the year. Ald. Boone reported for the fire and water committee, declaring that the freezeups had been repaired. Authorization was given to the fire and water committee to go ahead with repair work on Killarney Lake. Ald. Young reported for the finance committee, and said that in order to collect back taxes it was proposed that a collector be appointed for the purpose. The sum of \$200 was voted to the Victorian Order Nurse. The reports of the town officers were received and placed on file.

POLITICAL RUMOR

The latest political rumor is that E. C. Atkinson, M.P.P. for Sunbury County, will be a candidate for York County in the coming provincial election. Warden A. L. DeWitt, of Fredericton Junction, has been suggested as a candidate in Sunbury County.

U. N. B. DEBATING

A University of New Brunswick debating team comprised of Norman M. McLeod, Ernest B. Vandine and J. Edward Hughes, will leave tomorrow morning for Sackville, and Halifax, where they will uphold the negative of the resolution: "That the Economic Disorders of the World Necessitates the Acceptance of the Principles of Socialism". The first debate is to be held at Sackville on Wednesday night and the second with Dalhousie University at Halifax on Friday evening. Returning, the U. N. B. debaters will attend a meeting of the Confederation of Maritime Debaters at Truro on Saturday afternoon.

GOVERNMENT CAUCUS

The provincial government held a caucus today at noon for the purpose of considering bills for legislation. Premier Tilley had no announcement to make following the meeting. J. A. Doucet (Opposition, Gloucester), who commenced his speech on the budget debate last Friday continued this afternoon when the House resumed at 3 o'clock. It is expected that the Legislature will discuss at considerable length the matter of the Provincial Government asking the Federal Government for a bonus on potatoes. F. W. Pirie (Opposition, Victoria), gave notice of this motion on Friday last, and will make the motion in the House today and it will be seconded by Hon. A. A. Dysart, leader of the Opposition. W. Benton Evans of Queens county is likely to follow Mr. Doucet on the debate, coming on either today or tomorrow afternoon.

BUY NEW AMBULANCE

The Victoria Public Hospital Board held its regular monthly meeting last evening with the president, J. A. Reid, in the chair and the following other members present: Mrs. D. J. Shea, Mayor W. G. Clark, Alex. Davidson, C. E. Boone, Linke S. Morrison, Ald. Moses Mitchell, Dr. H. S. Wright, Councillor Cameron, and Dr. A. F. VanWart. The superintendent's report showed the following statistics: Number of patients in hospital at beginning of month, 46; admitted during month, 72; discharged during month, 75; patients at end of March, 43; medical cases admitted, 15; surgical cases admitted, 39; obstetrical cases admitted, 10; births, 8; deaths, 5; major operations, 22; minor operations, 18; X-ray examinations, 53; X-ray treatments, 6; maximum number of patients, in one day, 48; minimum number of patients in one day, 33. The meeting was mostly routine in nature. It was agreed that the purchase of a new ambulance for the use of the hospital was necessary. The immediate purchase of such was left to the Repair Committee.

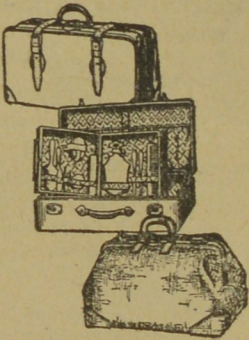
