

# Grand CULINARY CONTEST

WINNERS OF HONORABLE MENTION IN  
THE DAILY MAIL COOKING CONTEST

The following recipes were awarded  
honourable mention in The Daily  
Mail's Cooking Contest, in last Wed-  
nesday's judging:

**Cinnamon Buns**  
1 yeast cake.  
1½ cups scalded milk, or milk and  
water.  
½ cup butter  
½ cup sugar  
2 eggs.

Soak yeast cake in milk and let  
cool. Add enough flour to make a  
very soft dough. Allow it to rise until  
double its size. Add butter, sugar and  
beaten eggs. 1 teaspoon salt and  
enough flour to make it easy to  
handle. Roll out to half an inch in  
thickness and oblong shaped. Over  
this spread ½ cup sugar, ½ teaspoon  
cinnamon, 1 cup currants and ½ cup  
seeded raisins. Roll up the dough like  
a jelly roll and cut off buns an inch  
thick. Put in pans, let it rise more  
than double its size. Just before put-  
ting in oven, pour on a syrup made  
of 2 cups sugar, ½ cup water, boiled  
until it caramels slightly. Bake in  
slow oven over one hour.

**Chocolate Cake**  
½ cup butter  
1½ cups sugar  
3 eggs, well beaten. Cream together.  
½ cup milk  
1½ cups flour, 1 teaspoon baking  
soda, ¼ teaspoon salt, sifted 3 times.  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
2 squares melted chocolate  
**Frosting**  
2 cups pulverized sugar  
Butter size of an egg, melted with

2 squares of chocolate.  
Mix sugar with hot water  
½ teaspoon vanilla.  
Cover cake with marshmallows and  
add frosting. —Mrs. Byron Brewer

**Milk Buns or Rolls**  
Scald 1 pint milk.  
Add 1 tablespoon butter and cool.  
Add 1 yeast cake, after being dis-  
solved in lukewarm water.  
4 cups of flour, sifted, or enough  
when kneading to leave dough dry off  
hands.  
1 tablespoon sugar  
1 teaspoon salt  
Knead well and leave to rise in  
warm place two hours. Then place  
dough on mixing board. Roll out. Cut  
with sharp cutter, leave to rise again  
one hour. Bake in moderate oven 20  
minutes, then take buttered paper,  
and rub over hot rolls.

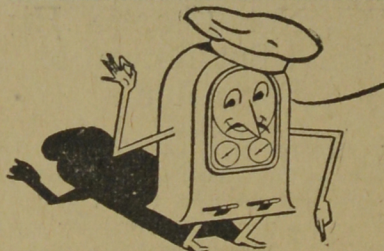
