At the Royal wedding which took place this morning at Buckingham Palace, Lady Alice's bridal gown was made of a new ivory pink material called crepe alalice, produced by British weavers and dyers for the wedding. It was soft with a silky satin finish. Its beauty lies mainly in the simplicity of design, the rich material and the unique trimming of orange blossoms which is inserted in the bodice front. The neck was cowl-forming a draped effect on the bodice and shoulders.

The halo headdress of orange blossom was studded with diamante and had a high point in the centre. It held in place a silk tulle veil tinted to match the gown.

As the family bridal veil of old lace was mislaid, Lady Alice wore tulle. The bridal bouquet was tied with a large bow of pink and gold transparent tulle, matching the trimming on the bridesmaids' dresses.
