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## England To Be On Hand at Olympics

LONDON, Nov. 6.—Preparations for sending a team to the winter and summer Olympic Games of 1936 are in full swing, Evan Hunter, Secretary of the British Olympic Association said today.

Germany's invitation to the association had been accepted at the annual general meeting in February he added, and there had been no further meeting to discuss the question of the Berlin games since nothing had happened to cause Britain to change her mind.

Mr. Hunter intimated the alleged ill-treatment of the Jewish race by German authorities would not affect the British decision to take part in the games to be held in Berlin next year.

Canada also accepted Germany's invitation to the Olympic Games a year ago, and plans for participation in the winter events here discussed at a meeting of the Canadian Olympic Committee in Montreal Saturday.

P. J. Malqueen, chairman of the committee, said that if any objections to Canada's participation in the games arose they would be discussed at the forthcoming meeting of the Amateur Athletic Association of Canada at Halifax.

## New Marathon Celebrity Is A Japanese Boy

TOKYO, Nov. 6.—A previously unknown Korean, Son Kitei rocketed to fame in Japanese sporting circles on Monday by winning a 26 1/4 mile distance race from a large field in record time during athletic games at Maji stadium.

Kitei was one of the three finishers whom officials said had broken the previous world's record for the distance.

The Korean finished in two hours, 26 minutes, 42 seconds. Second was Tamao Shioaki, salt maker and farmer from Shikoku prefecture, who was timed at two hours, 31 minutes, 15 seconds. Nobuichi Nakamaru was clocked in identical time.

Records established at the games are considered official.

## Mt. Allison And Acadia Play in Truro

### Both Teams in Fine Shape for Thursday's Game — Winners Play Fredericton City.

SACKVILLE, Nov. 6.—Word was definitely received here today by Bill Bell, manager of the Mount Allison football team, that the final "sudden death" struggle for the Maritime Intercollegiate title will be played in Truro on Thursday, Nov. 7.

The Mount Allison fifteen won the right to meet the Acadia ruggers by trimming U. N. B. 12-3 here Saturday, while the Wolfville squad eliminated St. Francis Xavier to snatch the Nova Scotia title.

Two years ago, in 1933, these same teams met for the Maritime title. The first game was played in Halifax and ended in a scoreless draw. The two teams then faced each other on the field at Truro with the temperature at 13 degrees below freezing and with an inch of snow on the ground.

It was a hard battle the New Brunswick champs winning 7-6 when Brodie booted a field goal in the dying moments to score four points and win the title for the Garnet and Gold.

Three members of the Mount A team of 1933 will go into action against Acadia again on Thursday. They are "Bob" Brodie, captain of the squad, playing in the flying-half position; Rollie Robertson, speedy hard tackling third-liner, who may play on the three-quarter line, and Charlie Burke, hefty scrum half.

Others who will make the trip will be: Roy MacKay, Don Storey, Jack Kerr, Norman MacRitchie, Gordon MacFarlane, Henry Blanchard and Arthur Woolner, forwards; Don Gough, half; Rus Johnson, fullback; and Mosher, Gascoigne and Neilson, Stone and Adair may win berths also.

Arrangements are being made to run a special train to Truro on the day of the game with about 200 students. Coach Ralph "Bud" Lister will accompany the team.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 6.—"We regret it very much," said Tommy Gorman, manager of the champion Maroons, when shown a despatch from Ottawa, stating that Fire Chief Sam Blackler had finally refused leave of absence to Alex Connell, goalkeeper of last year's team. "It means Connell's forced retirement from hockey and a loss to him of approximately \$25,000 or \$30,000. He had five or six seasons of good hockey left in him."

"However," continued Gorman, "we are delighted with the play of Billy Beveridge. He will be the outstanding goalkeeper of the National League. Even if Connell had secured leave of absence we would not have parted with Beveridge at any price. He will be with us for many seasons to come."

Gloom was cast into the Maroon camp today when it became known that Gus Marker's wife was seriously ill in the General Hospital here. Blood transfusions were given by Marker himself, and by Lionel Conacher in an effort to save her life. Mrs. Marker's home is in Tulsa, Oklahoma.
