

NOT TO GRANT FURTHER BUS SERVICES HERE

Bus Franchise Excludes Licensing Further Buses Here

Solicitor's Opinion

Application for Another Service is Argued About

An application for another bus service in this city, which would have its terminus point in Fredericton coming from Devon and Marysville and possibly from Oromocto, was temporarily shelved, when Mayor W. G. Clark, M. P.-elect indicated that the city could not issue any further licenses for buses to operate in this city. A company headed by W. E. Vaughan, and Sheriff C. N. Goodspeed recently was given an exclusive franchise to operate a bus service in the city.

Mayor Clark at last night's regular November meeting of the city council read the opinion of P. J. Hughes, K. C., city solicitor, on the matter. Mr. Hughes stated that the exclusive franchise already granted by the city excluded the licensing of further buses even though the new service operated on the Devon-Fredericton highway bridge. Mr. Hughes contends that this bridge is within the city.

Might Collect Fees

It was Mr. Hughes' further argument that the city of Fredericton could, if it wished, collect taxi license from the Devon and Marysville taxi drivers operating a regular taxi service over and to the Fredericton end of the highway bridge.

J. J. F. Winslow, K. C., of this city made application for the new company, which asked permission to operate three buses at the points mentioned.

The council held some discussion on the matter and there was variety of opinion as to the city's rights in the matter, and whether the Fredericton-Devon highway bridge was wholly within the city limits.

Ald. Dr. H. S. Wright thought it was a matter for the Motor Carrier Board to decide, when there was uncertainty of bus regulations between adjoining towns. Ald. Maxwell believed that where two municipalities are joined that the Board never has interfered. Ald. Wright said that it was no violation if a bus drops a passenger of this city on the bridge from Devon, or vice versa.

City Dump By-law

The by-law covering the new city dump was read and approved. Regulations covering dumping of refuse were included in the by-law, as read by Ald. Moses Mitchell. The clause specifying dumping hours brought forth an amendment proposed by Ald. T. Earle Doohan and seconded by Ald. Dr. Wright, that the hours of dumping be from 7 a.m. until 6 p.m. The dumping hours in the original clause were from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. The amendment was lost on the vote. The new dump will be in use, commencing November 15.

The motion approving the new dump by-law was made by Ald. Mitchell and seconded by Ald. Kitchen. Ald. Wright brought up the point of disposal of garbage declaring that the time had come for a much better system of disposal of waste. He argued that the old fashioned method

SHORT COURSE AGRIC. SCHOOL OPENS TODAY

Forty-One Enrolled at Opening of 13th Annual Course

New Dormitory

School Will Continue Until Dec. 19—Names of Students

The thirteenth annual short course to be conducted by the New Brunswick Agricultural School opened under the direction of the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture at the Dominion Agricultural Station here today. Ten counties of the Province are represented in the enrolment of forty-one students. The school will continue until December 19th.

Completion of a new dormitory on the Experimental Station premises this year lends improved equipment and accommodation to the school. Lectures will be held in the classrooms of the new building and affiliation with the Experimental Station enables students to augment classroom instruction with practical demonstrations and experiments. Instruction will be given both by officials of the new Brunswick Department of Agriculture and officers of the Station. Lectures will be given both in English and French.

Outline of Course

The course, as outlined today, embraces studies of livestock under the headings of feeding livestock, judging livestock and veterinary science. There will also be instruction in dairying, poultry and horticulture. Handling of crops will be taken care of by lectures and demonstrations in field husbandry.
