MOTHER'S DAY OBSERVED WITH SPECIAL SERMONS

Churches Pay Tributes To Mother in Special Sermons Sunday—The Services.

Tribute to the mothers of the world was paid in special sermons by the ministers of the various churches in this vicinity on Sunday. Mother's Day was generally observed in the city with the wearing of flowers and from the respective pulpits the pastors preached eloquently on the theme of Mother. The sermons were inspirational and eloquent.

At St. Andrew's Presbyterian church public worship was conducted in the morning by Rev. W. C. Kierstead and he also spoke in the evening, the regular pastor, Rev. Dr. G. E. Ross being out of the city. Theme of the day was Mother.

At the Brunswick Street Baptist church in the evening the mothers and daughters of all ages sat together in the centre section of the auditorium for the annual Mother's Day service. Rev. G. W. Guion, the minister, spoke at all services of the day. In the morning the theme was "Home". The Christchurch Parish church observed Holy Communion at eight o'clock in the morning. At the regular morning service the Men's Club of the church attended the service in a body. The pastor, Ven. Archdeacon A. F. Eate preached on the theme of Mother during the day.

Rev. George Telford, pastor of St. Paul's United Church delivered a Mother's Day sermon in the morning entitled "What Has Thou in the House?" The sacrament of baptism was celebrated at the conclusion of the morning service and the service was broadcast over station CFNB. The evening topic was "What Lack I Yet?"

At the Wilmet United church the morning service took the form of the annual baccalaureate service for the graduating class of the University of New Brunswick. The sermon title was "The Magnitudes of Life". In the afternoon at 3:45 o'clock a Mother's Day service by the Mission Band was held in which the junior choir participated. Several infants were baptized. The sermon in the evening was "Why Mothers Turn Gray", a message which was appropriate to the day and delivered by Rev. J. W. Bartlett, the minister.

At the Devon Baptist Church, Rev. D. L. Kennedy, delivered appropriate sermons, in the morning his theme being "Issues from Irrigated Channels", and in the evening a special service for Mother's Day. The ordinance of baptism was conducted following the evening sermon.

Rev. W. A. Burge spoke at all services of the Gibson Memorial United Church, the morning service at 11 A. M., being a special Mother's Day service. In the evening the series of sermons on "Progressive Christianity", were continued. Special music featured.

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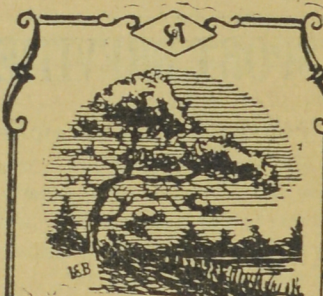
