Scouts' Banquet To Be Broadcast By Commission

Arrangements are now completed for the broadcast over the National Network of the Canadian Radio Commission from 9:00 to 10:00 P. M., A. S. T., on May 16th, of the Boy Scouts' banquet to be held in the Royal York Hotel, Toronto. In an international hook-up during the one hour broadcast, Lord Robert Baden-Powell, chief scout of the world, will address banquet at the same hour on the same night. Walter W. Head, chief of the Boys Scout of America, will reply to Lord Powell's address. He will speak from Chicago.

Solves Codes Easily

Solving secret codes has always been more or less of a cinch to Major Herbert O. Yardley, co-author of the Stories of the Black Chamber, heard over NBC networks. As a telegrapher working for the government he solved in two hours a five hundred word coded message from Colonel House to President Wilson. The simplicity of our secret codes determined him to build a cryptographic bureau that would rival those of any other country.

Gifted Organist Conductor to Direct Important Program

Ernest Dainty, one of the most able and popular musicians in Toronto radio, concert and theatre circles, will be the first of the "guest conductors" to be heard on the Commission national feature, "Concert Caravan", according to announcement from Stanley Maxted.

Mr. Dainty will direct this feature over a coast-to-coast network on Wednesday, May 8, at 10:00 P. M., A. S. T., presenting a brilliant program which will include the Overture from the opera "Figaro" by Mozart; Slavonic Dance No. 2 by Dvorak; "The Bee" of Schubert, with violins in unison; "Berceuse" by Gretchaninoff.

Associated on this same program will be four distinguished vocal artists nationally known to concert and air audiences. Frances James, Eileen Law Marshall, Alec Maurice and Lawrence DeFoe will be heard as follows:

Frances James singing "Nasturtium", by Dainty; Eileen Law Marshall singing "Art Thou Troubled" by Handel; Alec Maurice will present "The Vulcan's Song" by Gounod and Lawrence DeFoe will be heard to advantage in the colourful "Flower Song" from the opera "Carmen" by Bizet.

Frances James, whose lovely soprano voice is familiar to Canadian radio audiences, and whose recent recital at Hart House, Toronto, was an unqualified success, is to be heard as one of the featured vocalists on "Concert Caravan", presented from the Commission's Toronto studios on Wednesday, May 8 at 10:00 P. M., A. S. T.

Miss James has chosen for her song on this occasion, "Nasturtium", one of the charming compositions of Ernest Dainty, well known composer, organist and conductor, who will direct "Concert Caravan" on this date.

Immediately after her appearance

on this Canadian national network hour, Miss James will leave for Chicago where she will appear on May 12 for the Travel Club Concert. She will go to the Pacific coast for a month during which time she will be heard in recital both in Vancouver and Victoria, and will spend the summer months as guest artist at the Banff Springs Hotel.

Miss James, who is the wife of Murray Adaskin, will be heard with the Banff Springs Trio, under the direction of Murray Adaskin, violinist, and including Louis Cerer, pianist and Philip Spivak, cellist. She will return to Toronto in September.

Commission Will Broadcast the Quintuplets' Birthday

Arrangements for the broadcast of the birthday party of the Dionne quintuplets, who will celebrate their first anniversary on May 28, have been practically completed, Canadian Radio Commission engineers and program men announce. Prominent on the list of party guests who will be present at the little hospital near Caledonia, Northern Ontario, when the festivities take place, are Dr. A. R. Daboe and Judge J. A. Valin, official guardians; Dr. Fred Routley, Red Cross official, several nurses, and, of course, the parents of the children. The Commission plan to include in this 30 minute presentation a contrast between the voice of the quintuplets as they were six months ago and as they will be at the time of the broadcast. The sound of their voices as they were six months ago will be made possible by the blattnerphone recordings made last year when the Commission presented them to the world for the first time.
