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20TH CENTURY LIBERAL CLUB AT BURTT'S CORNER

Liberals Continue Drive In Preparation For the Forthcoming Election; More Speakers.

BURTT'S CORNER, York County, June 7—Scoring the government for the way in which they had increased the public debt of the province, politicalized the Workmen's Compensation Board and hindered progress in health, lumbering, and agriculture in the province of New Brunswick, the York-Sunbury 20th Century Liberal Association organized an affiliated club here as speakers continued their drive in preparation for the forthcoming election.

Donald C. Duffie declared that history was made at the Capital recently when the head of a party dared to stand before the people and assert that no matter what government was in power in Ottawa, the Liberal government in this province would oppose them if they did not deal justly with the demands of the people of this province.

The Liberal government will establish a department of Federal Affairs whose duty it will be to be on the tail of Ottawa, to regulate freight rates and to see to the movement of our products the world over.

Philip Desaulniers stated that it would be the policy of the Liberal party to protect the small lumbering operator and to make provision for a suitable stumpage rate based on accessibility and operating costs.

If any province ever needed aid to agriculture New Brunswick needs it today, declared Byron Fisher. The Liberal government will appoint a full time minister of Agriculture who knows the difficulties of the farmer. Murray Shanks declared that the cost of school books in Ontario was \$3.07 to the parent and another \$0.49 to the government, while in New Brunswick it was \$10.26 and the parent paid it all. The incoming government will provide for free school books for the children of this province.

Vernon Box dealt at length with the pay-roll padding in the northern counties and the findings of R. P. Hartley, K. C., Deputy Attorney-General who investigated the charges made by the opposition. "In one case", Mr. Hartley said after investigation, "I can reach no other conclusion than this man deliberately stole a large part of the \$3,265.75, which the payrolls are out". Continuing, he said, "I desire to point out that this case is a particularly glaring case of deliberate manipulation of the payrolls and that, in my opinion, this man should be punished for what he has done".

Mr. Box said that in spite of what Mr. Hartley said in 1931, no criminal action has been undertaken and only \$4.00 has been returned.

LIBERAL MEETING

WILLIAMSBURG, June 7—A meeting in the interests of the Liberal party was held at Williamsburg last evening when the principal speakers were Ald. H. Ralph Gunter, Fredericton and Ernest W. Stairs, Southampton, York County candidate.

Charging that armies of men were sent out on the roads prior to the last election and that on the day after the election rows of picks and shovels bore mute testimony to the lost battalion of labor, Mr. Stairs asserted that the road machines bought at exorbitant prices were being used to condition the roads while farmers remained idle and their teams stood in the barns.

Mr. Gunter said that "the Conservatives made a survey in 1930 and told the people Old Age Pensions were to be put into effect. They had ministers tell the people that anyone wishing application forms could obtain such from them. They went so far as to pass an act dealing with Old Age Pensions, but made it non-effective until proclaimed. They went to the people, were victorious. They never proclaimed the act or never repealed it. The Liberal Government will proclaim it".

Dealing with the shipment of potatoes to Egypt, the speaker pointed out that it cost the government \$1.28 per sack to get them there, and they re-
