## RADIO FAN MAIL

The postman rings much more than twice at 485 Madison Avenue, New York. He rings several thousand times a day where Columbia radio artists receive their mail. Often what he brings outgrows the classification of mail and becomes plain freight. A casual inventory the other day by the boys in the CBS mail room—Jerry Berg, William King and Michael Landy—uncovered a mail-bagful of anomalies.

Well, from a purely statistical standpoint, Cobina Wright gets the least—the least what?—the least adverse criticism. Out of all her mail, Cobina Wright has received only one unfavorable letter. All the rest are praiseful. Alexander Woolcott's mail has been written on everything from an old collar to the finest—and perfumed!—stationery. His has represented a cross section of all fan letter writers, from the poorest to the most aristocratic.

An international twist is lent by Bing Crosby and Annette Hanshaw. They draw a huge mail quota from Canada. Eddie Cantor has gone even more international. He recently got a matzoth through the mail; a real Passover Matzoth, all bound up in adhesive tape to prevent its breaking.
