## More Rainfall Might Cause Spring Freshet

(Continued from Page Eight) the storm developed into a veritable "sou'-wester". Later in the evening the rain turned to a thick driving sleet. Some slight disruption was done to wire communications.

Last night the water was still four feet from going over its banks in the low-lying areas around Manguerville and Sheffield.

It was in that section last year that extensive floods and breaking ice did serious damage to the highways and property. At the present rate of increase the river would overflow its banks in that territory within four days it is believed.

From Saint John it was reported that the week-end rains and wind raged in vain to batter down the resisting ice canopy on the Long Reach, but a five-mile expanse was still locked to its Saint John River fastening last night. The storm caused a noticeable rise of water in many sections and for the first time this spring at Indian-town there was a slightly higher level.

At four o'clock yesterday afternoon, the channel split open opposite Evandale wharf and in a few minutes the ice was cracking into huge slabs and moving out. All last evening the cakes ran past the mouth of the Belleisle to pile up on the barrier still holding immediately below Brown's Flat. This left the river clear from the lower end of Spoon Island below Hampstead to Brown's Flat, except for a few inlets and ice piled up on the beaches awaiting the rise of the swollen river, and several long shore stretches near Evandale. From shore to shore at Carter's Point the lower river is open to the sea.

## Change in Name Academic Department Kingston College

According to an announcement reaching The Daily Mail today the Academic Department of Kingston Bible College will, in future, be known as the Maritime Christian College. This college has established a standard as high as any preparatory school in the British Empire. Dr. J. W. Hill, formerly of the University of New Brunswick is now a member of the faculty of the Maritime Christian College. Mrs. Andrew Cruikshank of this city, is a sister-in-law.

The Registrar of the college has been advised by the Nova Scotia Department of Education that William A. Freeman, a student of that institution, has passed the Matriculation Examination of the University of London, England, which he wrote in January last. Mr. Freeman is a native of Rockland, N. S.

Mr. Freeman's studies have been under the direction of Professor John Warren Hill, M.A., (Yale) during the past year. Rev. Godfrey Lehman, (Leipsic and Princeton) was his teacher in New Testament Greek. Mr. Hill is to have charge of the Maritime Christian College and expects to have a large class writing the London Matriculation Examination next year.

Mr. Freeman expects to continue his studies in the Maritime Christian College toward the B. A., Intermediate Examination of London University.

## Governor Greeted By Newfoundland

ST. JOHN'S, Newfoundland, April 12—Governor Sir David Murray Anderson came back yesterday from England to receive a warm welcome in the island's old capital.

A police guard of honor met the head of the Commission Government and he drove to Government House through three arches stretched across streets gay with bunting.

On his trip to the Old Country he reported to the British Government on the commission's first year of administration.

## REQUIEM MASS FOR LATE MSGR. O'FLAHERTY

Rt. Rev. Monsignor F. L. Carney, pastor of St. Dunstan's Church at a Requiem Mass this morning, announced the death of Rt. Rev. J. M. O'Flaherty, dean of all priests in the Roman Catholic Diocese of Saint John, who died in St. Joseph's Hospital last evening. Monsignor Carney referred to the great loss in the death of Monsignor O'Flaherty. The mass was celebrated in memory of the late Msgr. O'Flaherty.

Rector of the Holy Rosary Church in St. Stephen for many years up to his retirement three years ago, the 84-year-old prelate had undergone an emergency appendix operation nine days ago. Only a month before he had left the hospital following a long treatment for bronchial trouble. Complications developed last night and he passed away quietly at 9:45 o'clock.

Between the time he left the hospital and the time he heentered the institution, Msgr. O'Flaherty had usually celebrated the 9:15 A. M. mass (the Bishop's Mass) in the Cathedral and his health had seemed more robust than that of a man much younger. Parishioners and friends had hoped that the devout priest had completely recuperated but he was stricken with his last in the Bishop's Palace where he had resided since retirement from his St. Stephen charge in 1932.

With the late Rt. Rev. E. A. LeBlanc, Bishop of Saint John, and Rev. H. F. Gillen, rector of the Cathedral, Msgr. O'Flaherty had made the long journey to Rome in February, 1934. He suffered from man attack of bronchial trouble, however, and was unable to visit the Pope.

Fifty-eight years ago on July 27, Msgr. O'Flaherty was elevated to the priesthood by the Archbishop of Quebec in that city after completing a brilliant theological course at the Grand Seminary there. He was a son of the late Dr. and Mrs. O'Flaherty of Woodstock, N. B. His preparatory studies for the priesthood were made at St. Joseph's University, where he attained the degrees of B. A. and M. A.

Friends will regret to learn of the serious illness today of Allen Chase, who is confined to his home on King Street. Mr. Chase was taken ill two days while at his work in Devon.


