Canadian Musical Hit To Be Heard

"The Quintuplets Lullaby," written by Gordon V. Thompson of Toronto, and a musical hit that has become a success in both Canada and the United States, will be the feature number on the "Babillage-Caprice" program heard from the Montreal studios of the Radio Commission tonight. Featured also on this program will be Jacques Girard, tenor, formerly of L'Opera Comique de Paris.

The orchestra and the quintet of mixed voices heard regularly on the program will present a number never before heard on this continent; "Dans un bouquet de houx," a lively French fox trot which is the outstanding song success in Paris at the present time. Music by such German composers as Wagner, Romberg, Haendel and Spindler will also be presented.

On the "Concert Hall of the Air" section of "Babillage-Caprice," the one hundredth anniversary of the death of the Italian composer, Bellini, will be remembered by the rendition of a number of his works.

NEW YORK, April 15—Johnny, the diminutive page boy of a cigarette program, heard each Tuesday at 9.00 p.m. AST., over an NBC-WEAF network, with Leo Reisman and his orchestra and Phil Ducey, baritone, is getting to be quite a linguist: that is, in a small way.

Johnny's Call heard at each broadcast, has been given in Swedish, Italian, Norwegian, French, Austrian and Polish, as well as English during recent programs. He admits they're tongue-twisters and also boasts that he hasn't slipped yet.

He can be found most any day hibernating with interpreters or poring over foreign dictionaries, muttering and mumbling to himself. No matter what language you hear on the program from now on, don't be misled. It's not an international broadcast from some foreign country, but the same program which still originates from the NBC studios in Radio City.

Jack Benny, Homebody

Jack Benny and Mary Livingstone are among the greatest homebodies among all the outstanding radio performers. If the comic NBC pair really want to do something extremely gay, they see a midnight movie. Nightclubs and night-life in general have little appeal for them.

Elliott Shaw, of the Revelers, blotters . . . Robert Simmons, bed room slippers.

Chicago NBC studio pick-ups: Announcer Don McNeill has a dog named "Radio Contract" in honor of his first commercial agreement but which he calls "Connie" for short, it being that kind of a dog . . . The Songfellows Quartet, consisting of Gunther Decker and Jack Williams, tenors, Carlos Fessler, baritone, and Burton Dole, bass, have been singing together since 1929 when they were students at Michigan State College . . . Gene Arnold was associated with the late Charles B. Dillingham, famous theatrical producer, as stage manager for Montgomery and Stone for four years.

Marjorie Hannan, heard as Sally of the Talkies in the NBC serial, had her early radio training at Station WLW, Cincinnati, Ohio. Contemporary microphone novices were Jane Froman, Ramona, Anne Seymour and Virginia Payne all of whom have risen into eminence on the NBC networks.

Snapshots from NBC's family album: Lucy Monroe, who sings on the Joe Cook program, is the daughter of Anna Laughlin, former musical comedy star . . . Ozzie (christened Oswald) Nelson, the bandman, is the American-born son of parents of Swedish descent. His grandfather, a Scandinavian nobleman, dropped his title when he migrated to America . . . Anne Jamison, the lyric soprano, was born in Belfast, Ireland, the daughter of a British army officer, and reared in India.

NBC studio pick-ups: Lanny Ross is a cross-word puzzle addict . . . Sigmund Romberg speaks several languages, an accomplishment which resulted in his serving in the intelligence division of the United States Army during the World War . . . Pinky Lee's lisp isn't acquired—he was born with it.

Audition Winner Is Guest Soloist

NEW YORK, April 15—Ross Graham, young Southern baritone and Audition winner, will be guest soloist with Rosario Bourdon's orchestra on the Cities Service Concert over an NBC-WEAF network on Friday, April 26, at 9.00 p.m., AST.

Graham, whose musical ability was discovered while he was an employee of the sponsor of the Cities Service Concerts, has been heard on previous Cities Service broadcasts and at the Radio City Music Hall in New York. Previous to his network debut he sang over a local station in his native city of Hot Springs, Ark. Jessica Dragonette and the Cities Service Quartet will also be heard as usual in the full hour concert from the NBC Radio City Studios.

Phil Baker has taken to carrying several pencils and a nice big pad around the studios with him. Listener response to Phil's idea of rhyming announcements on one of his recent programs was so favorable that the comedian is building a series of rhyme scripts. Every time an idea flashes, out comes pencil and pad—and Phil turns "poet!"

On his return from a trip to Canada, James Melton, golden voice of the air, was immediately signed for two more appearances on "the pause that refreshes on the air" on Friday nights over the NBC red network. He will be heard as guest star with Frank Black's orchestra on April 19 and again on May 3.

CRC To Celebrate Several Anniversaries

The year 1935 is an outstanding year in the world of music and to the program department of the Canadian Radio Commission, for during it the anniversaries of a number of famous composers have been, and will be, celebrated. The 250th anniversary of the birth of Johann Sebastian Bach was recently celebrated by the CRC by the "Aux Feux de la Rampe," a special program made up of selections by that composer. A Bach program was also presented in the "Masters of Music" series.

Other composers whose anniversaries are to be celebrated this year are Haendel, Saint-Saens, Bellini, Cacciatelli, and Borodin, and their music will be featured in certain "Babillage-Caprice" programs under the direction of Dr. J. J. Gagnier. The "Babillage-Caprice" presentation of April 15 will feature music by Haendel and the same program on April 22 will feature music by Borodin.
