This orchestra is slated to become a regular feature over the Commission's national network every Saturday from 11:30 P. M., to 12:00 Midnight A. S. T.

They are being given by the members of the two radio programs on which she is starred — "Waltz Time" and "Lavender And Old Lace" — as a send-off for the beautiful soprano, who is sailing for England June 1 to appear in pictures.

Opening Ceremonies To Be Broadcast—Plan Many Features

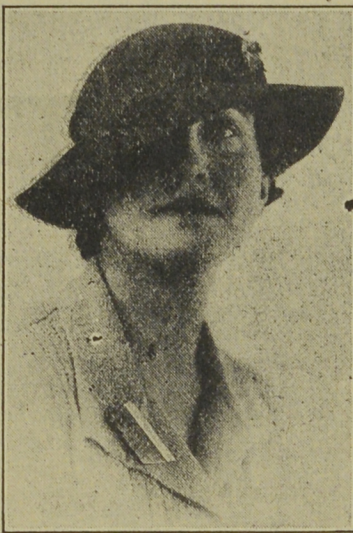
The opening this year of the Nova Scotia Apple Blossom Festival at Kentville will mean more than the usual publicity for Nova Scotia. Through arrangements sponsored by the Hon. A. S. MacMillan, Minister of Highways, the Canadian Radio Commission will tonight, carry on their principal network a programme one hour in length 8 to 9 Atlantic Standard Time, which will feature the opening of the Festival.

Some of the best talent available in the province has been recruited for this occasion by the Radio Commission, and the Maritime Director has promised that this sixty-minute offering will be the most impressive and artistic programme ever to go on the air from the Maritime Provinces.

One of the prominent features will be Mark Andrews' musical setting of Longfellow's immortal "Evangeline," made available through special arrangements with the author, Lorna Grayson, long a favorite with the Commission's national audience, will sing the principal soprano aria from the work "Fair was she to behold, the maiden of seventeen summers."
