On May 24th, he, Hickey, suggested the recovery of two trench mortars which had been abandoned in a disputed hole in the ground in the confusion of yesterday's fighting. He was advised against it. He was told that it could not be done; not one chance in one hundred! But he took that slim chance and won the gamble with death. He came back with the trench mortars. More than that, in his hunt for and return with the mortars he found a new, shorter and less deadly way between the support and reserve trenches and whatever served the battalion just then as a fire-trench. Having discovered that better route, he not only pointed it out but acted as guide to party after party of reinforcements. And in all this, not a scratch! But a chance bullet found him on the last day of that month and put out the light for one of the bravest, most merciful and most modest of Canada's sons.
