Mammoth Broadcast Over C. R. C. Coast To Coast Network Tomorrow

Sketches of Canadian Life Will Be Picked Up From All Parts of the Dominion and Broadcast to the Entire Country—Part of Hockey Game To Be Presented by CFNB.

On Wednesday, January 9th, Canadians will hear a broadcast which will add another milestone to Canadian achievements in Radio Broadcasting.

Sponsored by Imperial Tobacco Co. of Canada, and scheduled to be on the air from 10.30 to 11.30 P. M. AST, this broadcast will present one of the most ambitious programs ever undertaken this side of the border.

Working in close co-operation with the Canadian Marconi Company, the sponsors have secured the co-operation of the Dominion Pilot Service. One feature of the broadcast will take the listeners first to the Atlantic Ocean where a lonely lightship with its isolated crew battles gales and fog in order to provide a guiding light to incoming ships.

Another outstanding feature will be the three way conversation between Montreal, a pilot boat standing off Halifax Harbor, and another pilot boat performing duty off Victoria, B. C.

Captain G. E. L. Robertson, director of the Dominion Pilot Service, will speak to his pilots from Montreal.

Through the co-operation of the National Broadcasting Company in the United States, The Imperial Tobacco Company of Canada have been able to secure the voices of such outstanding Canadian stars of screen and stage as Walter Houton, who will be interviewed in New York by Mr. John B. Kennedy, another Canadian, well-known on the air.

Among other Canadian stars of screen and stage who will be heard on this record-breaking broadcast, are: David Manners, interviewed in Hollywood by Jimmy Wellington from New York. Fifi D'Orsay, who hails from Quebec, and who will be heard in a conversation with Montreal, and Arlene Jackson, who will perform with the forty-five piece orchestra.

Among the many other features which the sponsors have scheduled for the hour, there will be a play-by-play description of a hockey match from Fredericton, New Brunswick, a dramatic sketch from Winnipeg, and several orchestra selections from Montreal, when Henri Miro will swing the baton over the Imperial Symphony Orchestra, comprising 45 musicians, and the Imperial Choir of 60 voices.

The program will be brought to a close by the introduction of Mr. Gray Miller, President of Imperial Tobacco Company, by Mr. Tingle.

Mills Brothers Engaged For Bing Crosby's Programs

The Mills Brothers, "four boys and a guitar," who form one of radio's most popular harmony combinations, have been engaged to appear with Bing Crosby in his programs over the WABC-Columbia network from 10.00 to 10.30 P.M. AST, each Tuesday, starting tonight. The four brothers will arrive in Hollywood, after a highly successful personal appearance tour throughout the country, to broadcast from KHJ, Columbia's Los Angeles outlet, with Bing and Georgie Stoll's Orchestra.

A chapter in radio history was written in October 1931, when the four brothers, young Negroes from Piqua, O., crashed the Columbia studios to seek an audition. Without official entree, they managed to get the audition and were immediately signed as a new Columbia feature. With no advance ballyhoo, their success was immediate. Before the end of the first broadcast, Columbia's switchboard was tied up by curious listeners, who asked who they were, what instruments they played. Veteran musicians refused to believe that they could simulate such instruments as tuba, clarinet, saxophone and trombone with their voices. Yet only a guitar accompanied their singing. The brothers, John, 23; Herbert, 21; Harry, 20; and Donald, 19, (present ages)—made the fastest "clock" in radio history, and went on to accomplish further laurels on stage and screen. They have appeared before with Crosby, first in the film, "The Big Broadcast," then in a number of phonograph recordings featuring the popular baritone supported by the quartet, and last year in a series of Bing's Columbia programs for his current sponsor.

Canadian listeners will hear a plane taking off, piloted by Captain Wop May, hero of many Arctic flying adventures. He will say a few words before he opens the throttle.
