

HOUSE PASSED EIGHT BILLS YESTERDAY, MET IN COMMITTEE

Coroners' Act Change Amongst Those Held Up;
Major Brooks Presides Over House in Committee.

There was a short session of the Legislature yesterday afternoon not lasting more than an hour the House meeting at 3.15, and adjourning about four o'clock.

The House met in committee for the first time during the present session. Major Brooks was in the chair. Four government and seven private bills were considered. Of these eight were recommended and will be read a third time today.

The House met at 3.15 p.m. MR. WOOD, from the Committee to present the Address to His Honor, announced a message from His Honor the Lieutenant Governor.

MR. SPEAKER then read the following message:

"Mr. Speaker and gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

"I thank you for your address, and beg to assure you that I entertain the fullest confidence that in all your deliberations you will be guided by a most earnest desire to promote the happiness and prosperity of the people of this Province.

"(Signed) MURRAY McLAREN"

Lieut. Governor of New Brunswick The following bills were read a second time:—to confer certain powers upon the Governor-in-Council respecting insurance; to continue the possible reduction in teachers' salaries for one year.

MR. ATKINSON presented the report of the Municipalities Committee. MR. GROOM presented the report of the Standing Rules Committee.

MR. MELVILLE presented the report of the Agricultural Committee.

MR. WOOD presented a petition for a bill to authorize the Regents of Mount Allison University to invest certain funds.

HON. MR. STEWART presented petitions for bills relating to the Town of Campbellton and to amend the Act to Incorporate the Town of Campbellton.

HON. MR. LEGER submitted the report of the Public Utilities Commission and the Motor Carrier Board.

MR. BROOKS gave notice of motion for suspension of the rules to permit the introduction of bills relating to the town of Sussex.

MR. VIOLETTE gave notice of motion to permit the introduction of a bill regarding Madawaska.

MR. PRIE moved that the bill for division of the Parish of Drummond be referred to the Law Committee.

The House went into Committee with Mr. Brooks Chairman to consider the following bills.

There was some discussion on the bill to provide for the redemption of \$882,000, provincial debentures falling due in 1933.

HON. MR. LEGER said that it was proposed to redeem \$100,000 of the above amount which were bonds issued for the International Railway, as there was sufficient accumulation of Sinking Fund to provide for them. On the other hand, while they were for twenty years there had been no general Sinking Fund provision in force longer than ten years, therefore they could not be redeemed for another ten years. Replying to Mr. Dysart, he said that all of the bonds, not specially provided for by Legislation, were protected by the Sinking Fund of one-half of one per cent annually. The bill was ordered reported.

On the bill to amend the Schools Act respecting teachers' salaries there was some discussion.

MR. DYSART said that some of the Tax-payers Associations wished this

legislation to be continued until economic conditions were more satisfactory and enquired as to why its extension was limited to one year.

HON. MR. HARRISON said that the legislation provided for the school term extending from June, 1935 to June, 1936, so that there would be another Session of the House before its expiry, when the Act might be dealt with according to the conditions then prevailing. He added that there was another provision in the Schools Act which enabled an arrangement for employing teachers at reduced salaries between any school district, the inspector and the general superintendent. The minimum salary from all sources, however, must not be less than \$300.

MR. DYSART said he was aware of that provision and he also knew that it was sometimes not easy for a poor school district to make arrangements with the Inspector and Chief Superintendent, as those officials tried to keep salaries up. Sometimes schools were closed in consequence. The bill was ordered reported.

The bill regarding illegitimate children was referred to the Law Committee.

The bill to amend the Coroners Act was discussed.

MR. RICHARD (Gloucester) said that the records of Coroners inquests should continue to be filed with the Clerk of the Peace in each county and not sent to Fredericton to be kept there permanently. Perhaps two copies could be made, one for the Clerk of the Peace and one for the Deputy Attorney General.

HON. MR. HARRISON said he could see no particular reason why the depositions should be filed with the Clerk of the Peace when it was generally known that they were kept on file at Fredericton, but he had no particular objection to his honorable friend's suggestion. The committee reported progress on this bill. The Committee rose and submitted its report which was adopted by the House.

The House again went into Committee, with Mr. White as Chairman to consider the following bills: those accepted without amendment related to Woodstock debentures, McAdam assessment, Devon debentures and Fredericton debentures. The bill relating to Marysville debentures was referred back to the Municipalities Committee and the Victoria County Loan bill was amended. The Committee rose and reported.

NORTH AMERICAN TROTTERS DO WELL IN FOREIGN FIELDS

NEW YORK, Feb. 28—American trotters shipped to Europe since the close of the last campaign continue to hold their winning form on foreign tracks. Following the victory of Muscletone, 2:02, in the Prix d'Amerique at Vincennes, France, on January 23, Emily Stokes, 2:01½, another contender for the \$25,000 Hambletonian at Goshen last August, won the Importation Stake for mares at Rome in her first start abroad. Among the other starters were Calumet Eleanor, 2:05½, campaigned last season by E. Roland Harriman; Miss Willing, 2:07½, a winner last fall at the Mineola Fair for Thomas I. Havens, of Flanders, L.I.; Varuna, 2:11, a five-year-old daughter of Guy Axworthy, 2:08½, and Taurida, 2:04½, full sister to the dam of the Hambletonian winner, Lord Jim, 2:00½.

C. B. Shaffer, Chicago owner of Coldstream Farm, in Kentucky, and breeder of Muscletone, has sent Ruth M. Mac, the two-year-old sister of the international winner, to Hunter C. Moody, a Lexington trainer, to develop for the juvenile futurities of 1935 and the Hambletonian Stake of 1936. Meanwhile Fred Egan, who trained Emily Stokes for her breeder, C. W. Phellis, crack wing shot of the New York Athletic Club, is schooling at Seminole Park, in Florida, her two-year-old brother, Balbo, and her three-year-old sister, Tilly Tonka, for the same fixed events. LARGEST CLOCK IN WORLD TO BE IN MONTREAL

MONTREAL, Quebec, Feb. 28—The world's largest clock, with a total dial area nearly seven times as great as London's "Big Ben", is being designed and constructed by a Montreal firm and will be erected next summer at the top of a 60-foot steel tower on the roof of a brewery here.

The giant timepiece will be visible in Montreal and surrounding districts day and night. Brilliantly illuminated with a special Neon lighting system, it will be seen ten miles away at night.

The clock will have three dials facing three ways. The diameter of each face will be 60 feet. The mechanism will weigh about six tons. Nine thousand feet of tubing and several tons of other equipment will be used in making and installing the clock.

The distance on the dial between the minute marks will be 3.14 feet, and the space between the hour marks, 15 feet. Each of the minute hands will be 30 feet long from centre to tip and weigh 2,500 pounds. The hour hand will be 20 feet long.
