

HEARING OF CHARGES AGAINST BROAD BEGUN

Charged With Theft and Possession of Weapon, Was Remanded Preliminary Hearing Articles of Clothing Are Produced in Court by Prosecution

Preliminary hearing in the case against Harry Bailey Broad, who is charged with two offenses, one that of theft from a general store here and the other being in possession of a weapon, was begun this morning in the first charge. Broad pleaded not guilty and elected trial by jury. Three witnesses were heard for the prosecution this morning and Magistrate Walter Limerick remanded Broad until Monday at eleven o'clock when further witnesses will be examined. Leo F. Cain who conducted the prosecution this morning called three witnesses—Officers Ken Foster and Harry McNeill, of the police force and Garfield Lund, chief clerk of Relief Project Nos. 1, 2, and 3 with headquarters in this city. Articles of clothing, shoes, a kit bag and a suitcase were produced by the prosecution and identified by police officers as that found at the home of Harry Booker, Royal Road on the night of February 4, and where the accused was arrested. The second charge, that of being in possession of firearms will be proceeded with on Monday at which time Sergeant William Hughes is expected to give testimony. A bereavement in his family kept Sergeant from testifying this morning.

LEGISLATURE IN ROUTINE THIS AFTERNOON

Afternoon Session Likely To See House Occupied With Bills Budget Tomorrow Government Held Brief Meeting This Morning, Committee Meeting

The New Brunswick Legislature continued on its third week this afternoon and was scheduled to be occupied with private bills and routine for the remainder of today, anticipating the bringing down of the 1935 budget tomorrow by Hon. A. J. Leger, the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer. While the budget will be brought down tomorrow, debate on it will not actually commence until next week. The government held a brief meeting this morning, considering matters of legislation and House routine. No delegations appeared. The Municipalities Committee held its second meeting this morning, it being a short one, and the committee considering three bills, all dealing with municipality finance. None of the bills were of local origin. The government heard two delegations yesterday, one from the New Brunswick Federation of Labor, the other from the N. B. Fish and Game Protective Association. The labor delegates presented their proposed amendments to the Workmen's Compensation Act and were hopeful that certain of the proposals would receive favorable consideration. The Federation's delegation presented the general resolutions adopted at the annual convention here last week. The Fish and Game delegation urged the prohibition of moose and ruffed grouse shooting during 1935 and the establishment of additional game refuges this year. The revival of any bounty on bears was opposed and appointment of game wardens for duty from February 1 to April 15, of each

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BOARD OF PUBLIC UTILITIES TABLED IN LEGISLATURE

The report of the New Brunswick Board of Public Utilities for the year ending April 30, 1934, was tabled in the New Brunswick Legislature yesterday by Hon. A. J. Leger, K. C., provincial secretary treasurer. The financial statement showed a bank balance of \$1,717.96, while total receipts were \$15,082.62. During the year certificates were issued to eight companies under the provisions of part one of the Sale of Securities Act. Licenses were issued to 30 brokers and 74 agents. The report of the New Brunswick Motor Carrier Board for the calendar year ending December 31, 1934, which was tabled also, disclosed that 31 motor bus passenger franchises and twelve motor-bus freight franchises were operating. The total mileage of routes of the former was 1,235 1-2; the total number of miles paralleling railway, 542; total gross earnings, \$97,208.73; total number of passengers carried, 467,309; total weight of vehicles, 177,319 pounds; total seating capacity, 504; total cost of vehicles, \$111,661.81. Statistics among the motor-bus freight franchises showed the total mileage (one-way), 798; total number of miles paralleling railway, 515; total gross earnings, \$23,194; total gross weight of goods, carried, 3,601 tons; total value of vehicles, \$19,040; total gross earnings, \$23,194; total gross pounds; total tonnage capacity of vehicles, 22 1-2.

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AN ENORMOUS QUANTITY OF SNOW IN N. B.

Country Roads Blocked by Huge Pile-up of Snow Colder This Morning Present Month has Seen 24 Inches of Snow; More Than 1934.

The Province of New Brunswick, which has been veritably deluged in snow in recent weeks, gives fair promise of setting a record for snowfall for the present month of February. It was reported this morning from the Dominion Experimental Station here that a total of about 24 inches had fallen this month. Last year in February the total was only 23 inches and it was considered a modern record. Today many roads throughout the province were blocked by snow and farmers were forced to utilize their labor for clearing out the roads in the vicinity of their homes. Provincial highways were blocked, too, and it was impossible to make much headway by motor car. In fact, in many cases cars were stuck and had to be helped out of the snowbanks. The past week has witnessed almost ten inches of snow in Central New Brunswick. City employees have been busy all week with snowplows and shovels clearing away the snow from the streets here. Even yet traffic by foot is unpleasant and inconvenient.
