## LARGE FUNERAL TODAY FOR LATE GEO. TENNANT

The funeral of the late George A. Tennant, prominent and popular young business man, who died suddenly on Wednesday while attending jury duty at the York County Court, took place this afternoon and it was one of the largest funerals held in the city for a long time. The remains of the late Mr. Tennant rested at the Brunswick street Baptist Church from one o'clock until 3.15 o'clock. At 3.30 o'clock an impressive service was conducted at the church by Rev. Gerald W. Gulou in which he paid high tribute to the deceased whose sudden death had deprived the city of a talented and able resident. The late George Tennant had been energetic in affairs of the church and his passing will be cause of general regret. Members of the Fredericton Lodge No. 6, Knights of Pythias marched from the lodge rooms in Queen street to the Brunswick street Baptist Church to attend the service in a body, and a number of the members acted as ushers. Members of the local branch of the Canadian Legion also attended. Prof. W. J. Smith officiated at the organ and the choir assembled with the mourners. Interment was made at the Rural Cemetery Extension where the K. of P. ritual was conducted at the graveside.

## Dairy Products Acts Strongly Recommended

The bill was recommended.

Hon. W. H. Harrison, K.C., Atty.-General, stated that a bill to consolidate and amend the Life Insurance Act would be a uniform Act throughout Canada except Quebec, and could not become effective in this province until it was adopted in the other provinces. The bill had been considered carefully at several conferences of insurance superintendents of the different provinces.

R. P. Hartley, K.C., deputy attorney-general and superintendent of insurance for New Brunswick and also president of the Dominion organization, explained the new section of the bill. The bill was recommended.

The next bill considered was an Act respecting Dairy Products. Hon. Lewis Smith, minister of agriculture, in explaining briefly the purport of the bill, pointed out that it pertained largely to milk and cream.

The bill would provide for a commission to regulate in established areas the sale and handling of milk and cream. Hon. Mr. Smith stated that he was of the opinion that the bill met with the general approval of the people.

John Woods of Bloomfield Station, supported the bill.

H. Legassick, Lakeside, supported the bill and stated that it provided the farmer with a needed protection.

The bill was considered section by section.

The bill was recommended, with minor amendments.

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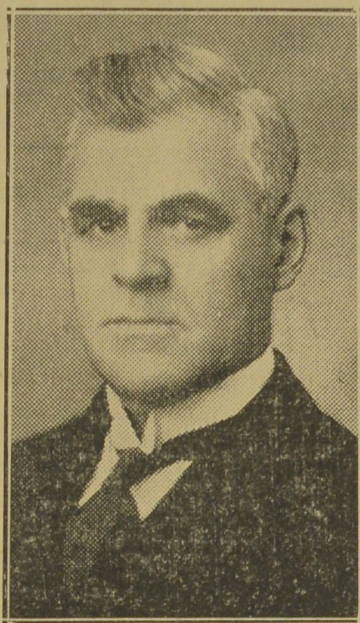
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## Young Man Yet



HON. A. A. DYSART, K.C., LL.B.  
Leader of the Opposition, who will be Fifty-Five Years Old Tomorrow, March 22nd.

Tonight friends in Fredericton will hold a gathering at a local cafe in honor of Hon. Allison A. Dysart, who will have a birthday tomorrow.

Allison A. Dysart was born at Cocagne, Kent County on March 22, 1880. He is a son of Andrew Knox Dysart of English and Scotch descent and Henrietta Outler of English descent. His father founded and helped to build the first Presbyterian church in Cocagne, Kent County. The old building is still standing and a good sturdy Kirk it is. Mr. Dysart was educated at the Guelph Agricultural College, at St. Joseph's College, and at Dalhousie Law School at Halifax from which place he received his law degree. Mr. Dysart was married in September, 1916, to Miss Blanche C. McDougall, daughter of John J. McDougall of Glace Bay, N. S.

Mr. Dysart was first elected to the New Brunswick Legislature at the general elections of 1917 and again in the later elections being now in his eighteenth session in the Legislature. He was elected Speaker of the House on March 17, 1921, and continued in that capacity until 1925. In June, 1925 he was sworn in Minister of Lands and Mines, the department now held by Premier Tilley. He held this portfolio in the Veniot Government and went out of office when his party was defeated at the polls. Mr. Dysart was chosen leader of the opposition in 1926. His home is at Buctouche where he practices law. Buctouche is a French centre and although a Scotchman by descent, Mr. Dysart can speak French fairly well and has a large number of friends amongst the people of that section of the country.

Mr. Dysart has two brothers practicing law at Winnipeg. Another brother Hon. A. K. Dysart is Judge of the Supreme Court of Manitoba.

wait for them for a few days, finally bringing them back to Canada.

The pilgrimage to Vimy is wholly under the auspices of the Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L., and is being promoted as a non-profit making affair throughout. Those who may take part in the pilgrimage are ex-service men and women and their immediate relatives. Immediate relatives is defined for the purpose of the pilgrimage as follows: In case of ex-service man, the wife, children, father, mother, sisters and brothers are eligible; and in case of ex-service woman, the same as the foregoing except that husband is substituted for wife.

## CONTINUE PROBE

The chief game warden, Major H. H. Ritchie, is continuing his investigation of the illegal deer slaying which was unearthed this week in Madawaska and Restigouche counties. In the widespread deer slaughter which had occurred within the past month or so no less than 140 quarters of deer have been seized. Between 12 and 15 men had been apprehended. Prosecutions are expected to be carried out against other men within the next few weeks.

## CONGRATULATES CITY ON SPLENDID RELIEF SYSTEM

Speaking before the Twentieth Century Political Club which held an interesting meeting last night at the Club rooms in Queen Street, Ronald Burke discussed unemployment relief systems as practiced throughout Canada, and in the course of his remarks stated that the City of Fredericton had "the best relief system in Canada." He credited E. C. Armstrong, who is in charge of the dispensation of relief here, for the success of the system here.

The speaker outlined relief as carried on in Canada since 1930, reviewing in particular New Brunswick's efforts in this regard. Forty five attended the meeting and Douglas Brewer acted as chairman. General discussion was held after the address by Mr. Burke.

## APPEAL COURT CONCLUDES

The New Brunswick Appeal Court concluded its adjourned sitting here this morning, taking under consideration two cases which were re-argued. The case of Minnie Bell Noble, administratrix of the estate of Leighton A. Noble, parish of Kent, Carleton county, versus the Bath, Bristol and Florenceville hydro electric district commissioners, was completed yesterday afternoon and re-argument in the estate of John Thompson McGuire, deceased, retired lumberman of the parish of Dumbarton, Charlotte county, was made this morning. Mr. Justice Richards replaced Mr. Justice LeBlanc on the bench in this case.

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## CORPORATIONS COMMITTEE IN LIGHT SESSION

The Corporations Committee, with Hon. G. H. I. Cockburn, government member from Charlotte County in the chair, recommended two bills and deferred another for later consideration at a short meeting today at noon.

The first bill considered was one providing that the 5 percent first mortgage bonds of the regents of Mount Allison dated October 1, 1934, and maturing October 1, 1954, be declared authorized investment for trustees.

H. M. Wood gave a brief explanation. The bill was deferred for consideration this afternoon.

The next bill, one entitled an act to incorporate the Roman Catholic bishop of Saint John. The bill was recommended.

The next bill, one authorizing the Maritime Trust Company to the number of its directors was recommended. The meeting will continue this afternoon.

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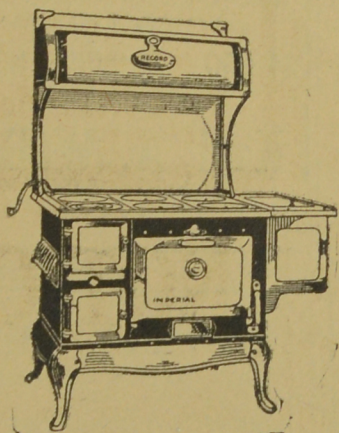
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
