## Minneapolis Symphony To Broadcast New Mass By Paul Nordoff

A new secular Mass for orchestra, mixed quartet and mixed double chorus by Paul Nordoff will be the highlights of the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra program, conducted by Eugene Ormandy, to be broadcast over the nationwide WABC-Columbia network today, from 4.15 to 6.00 P. M., AST.

The assisting artists to be heard on this occasion will include the Twin City Chorus under the direction of Rupert Sreom, with Corinne Frank Bowen, soprano; Adair Macroe Roberts, contralto; Edmund D. Cronen, tenor, and Berthold Busch, baritone. Paul Nordoff, composer of the new "Secular Mass," is a graduate of the Juilliard School of Music in New York City and has already written extensively for orchestra and string ensembles.

Preceding Nordoff's work, Ormandy will conduct the orchestra in Schubert's Symphony No. 8 in B minor. Following the Mass the Orchestra will play Cesar Franck's D minor symphony.
