County on the April  
Docket

The New Brunswick Supreme Court, Appellate Division, will commence its April sitting on Tuesday of next week, with Chief Justice J. B. M. Baxter, Mr. Justice Grimmer and Mr. Justice Richards expected to preside. The docket is a small-sized one and there are no cases from York county. The complete docket to be argued is as follows:

Crown Paper—The King vs. Henry Eandry; Mr. E. R. McDonald, K. C., for the accused, to support appeal from conviction before Chief Justice Barry. The King vs. Leo LeBlanc; Mr. J. A. Creaghan, for the informant, to support an appeal, under the Intoxicating Liquor Act, from the judgment of the judge of the Northumberland County Court.

Appeal Paper, County Court—Reuben Vender vs. The Town of Edmundston; Mr. F. Dodd Tweedie, for the plaintiff, to support appeal from the Madawaska County Court.

FELICITATIONS  
EXTENDED TO  
KING GEORGE V.

Premier Tilley Extends  
Greeting of Legisla-  
ture to His Majesty

Greatest Sovereign

Wish Many Years of  
Happy, Prosperous and  
Peaceful Reign

As the New Brunswick Legislature met for its final afternoon session yesterday at 3.30 o'clock Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, premier of the province, took the occasion to extend on behalf of the House of Assembly of the province of New Brunswick, felicitations on the happy completion of the twenty-fifth year of King George the Fifth's "eventful and glorious reign". We rejoice to pay homage to His Majesty, not only as a sound constitutional monarch, but as the outstanding figure in mighty empire, declared Premier Tilley.

The resolution passed in the House respecting the felicitations to the King was as follows:

"Therefore Be It Resolved: That this House of Assembly, of the Province of New Brunswick, Dominion of Canada, now in Session, requests His Excellency the Governor General of Canada, on behalf of this Assembly, to assure His Majesty of the deep loyalty and affection of the people of New Brunswick, and of their sincere well wishes that His Majesty the King and Her Gracious Majesty the Queen may enjoy many more years of happy, prosperous and peaceful reign."

Premier Tilley in moving the resolution spoke as follows:

"This Province, discovered and colonized by the intrepid French Explorers early in the Seventeenth Century, and having its development greatly stimulated some years later by sturdy Loyalists, whose love and attachment for British institutions, caused them to take up their abode in this Province, yields no first place to other portions of the British Empire in its loyalty and devotion to the British Crown."

Since His Majesty's ascension to the Throne on May the Sixth, 1910, great and manifold have been the blessings bestowed upon the people of our far flung Empire, and while we are, at the present time, living among problems and difficulties which are confronting all Nations, we look forward with confidence, to the successful return to normal prosperity.

Our people recall, with pardonable pride, the visits of His Majesty to New Brunswick, first as an midshipman in the Royal Navy, and secondly as the Duke of Cornwall and York. We also remember, with pride, that it was at the City of Saint John, our principal gateway for expending Inter-empire trade, that His illustrious son, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, first set foot on the soil of Canada.

We in New Brunswick, are proud to extend to His Majesty as the greatest and most democratic of living Sovereigns, our expressions of appreciation, homage and loyalty;

Therefore, on behalf of this House of Assembly, I beg to move, seconded by Hon. Mr. Dysart, Leader of His Majesty's Loyal Opposition, the Resolution."

His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark, who returned last week from an important conference of mayors of the various cities in the Dominion, informed the city council at its monthly meeting here this week, that he would detail the progress of that meeting to the council members at an early date, probably at the May meeting of the council. 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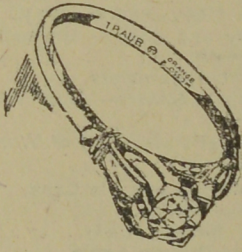
