## 1935 TENNIS TOURNAMENT COMES TO CONCLUSION

The 1935 New Brunswick Tennis Tournament came to a conclusion here on Saturday afternoon after a week of thrilling tennis, which crowned new champions in provincial tennis. Saturday as well as all during the week huge galleries watched the play at the Riverside Tennis Club.

Ross Wilson of Toronto won the men's singles championship when he defeated J. W. O'Hara, Ottawa's first ranking player, winning spectacularly in straight sets, 7-5, 6-1, and 6-1. Wilson was at the peak of his form and his powerful topspin forehand drive scored point after point, relentlessly and conclusively on the Ottawa player.

Mrs. Harold F. Jones of Halifax had captured the ladies' singles title on Saturday morning, defeating Mrs. F. V. Woodbury in straight sets.

## A Thrilling Match

There were no local players in the final play they having been eliminated on the previous day. The best match of the tourney from point of competitive play was the mixed doubles final in which J. W. O'Hara and Mrs. F. V. Woodbury defeated Eric Woodworth and Miss Jean Jardine after three long and strongly-fought sets.

The men's double final was captured by R. Wilson and A. Eaton who defeated L. Keating (M.) and E. Woodworth, 6-1, 6-4, and 6-1.

In the finals of the Junior Ladies' singles, Miss Isabel Matheson defeated Miss E. Lord to win the title. She won in straight sets although the last one went to 12-10. B. Hall of Toronto defeated H. Hauck of Orono, Me. to capture the junior men's singles championship.

At the conclusion of play prizes were presented to the various winners from the provincial body by Horace A. Hanson of this city, president of the N. B. Tennis Association. Mr. Hanson expressed the opinion that the tournament play had provided a great stimulus to tennis in this section of the province.
