Started in radio as a free lance announcer and producer in 1930. Two years later joined Washington CBS staff as a continuity writer and announcer. Wants to practice law one day. ## OTTAWA REGISTERS

OTTAWA, Aug. 3—An earthquake of moderate intensity was reported today by the Dominion Observatory. The first preliminary tremor occurred at 11 hours 15 minutes six seconds eastern standard time, Thursday morning, August 1. The distance to the epicentre was 3,800 kilometers or 2,360 miles. The record continued for two hours.
