

FIRST SHIPMENT OF POTATOES LEFT PROVINCE

About 15,000 Barrels of
Seed Potatoes for
Cuba

Two Varieties Used

Expect to Ship 100,000
Barrels During
the Winter

The first boatload of New Brunswick seed potatoes for the Cuban market will leave St. John immediately, it was learned from shipping circles today. About 5,000 barrels will comprise the first shipment for the Cuban crop, it was announced by Hon. F. W. Pirie, Minister of Lands and Mines.

"During the winter, we expect about eight vessels to carry approximately 100,000 barrels of two varieties of New Brunswick seed potatoes to Cuba," declared Hon. F. W. Pirie. "The La Perla, which arrived in St. John from Boston last night, will take about 15,000 barrels, or the equivalent, to Havana. These are for the first Cuban crop," he said.

Mr. Pirie said that the Cuban market would be about the same this year as last. "They use different varieties of our seed potatoes for their different crops," Mr. Pirie explained. "Their first crop is ready to be sown and we expect to ship about four carloads of this brand." The United Fruit liner La Perla, consigned to H. E. Kane & Co. Ltd., arrived in St. John late Sunday night.

Toward December, the demand for second crop variety of New Brunswick seed potatoes will begin. Mr. Pirie continued. "As far as we can tell, there should be another four cargoes leave St. John for Cuba. These shipments will average about 12,000 barrels per ship. They will be spread out over the winter shipping season. This 15,000 barrel consignment, now being loaded is rather large."

FIND TRUE BILLS IN TWO CASES AS COURT OPENS

William Clark Pleads
"Not Guilty"—Jury
Empanelled

Trial at 2.30 p.m.

Justice J. H. A. L. Fairweather Welcomed by
Local Barristers

True Bills were found this morning in the only two cases before the September sitting of the York County Circuit Court, presided over by Justice J. H. A. L. Fairweather, which opened its session here this morning in the County Court House. The two cases were Byard Brewer, Burt's Corner, and William Clark of this city.

In the case of William Clark who is charged with driving a motor car while under the influence of intoxicating liquor a true bill was found. Clark pleaded not guilty to the charge. The petit jury was empanelled and his case will be heard this afternoon at 2.30 o'clock.

J. J. F. Winslow, on behalf of the barristers of Fredericton, delivered an address of welcome to Justice Fairweather who is presiding over his first court in Fredericton. Mr. Winslow congratulated the new Justice on his elevation to the Bench and pledged the loyalty of the Bar to the Bench. He said it was interesting to observe how the courts of the land had maintained the confidence and respect of the people. This, he thought, was in a large measure due to the integrity and wisdom of the judges. He said he knew Justice Fairweather would maintain the prestige of the Bench in his new appointment.

Justice Fairweather

Justice Fairweather in reply said he was deeply touched by the tribute paid him by the Fredericton barristers. He realized the conditions only too well, he said, and declared he would do his best to uphold the honor and integrity of the Bench. In speaking of Fredericton he said that the Capital City seemed like a second home to him, having spent four pleasant years here at the University of New Brunswick.

In charging the Grand Jury the new Justice said: "People driving motor vehicles should be in such a state as to have proper control of them at all times." He also suggested that the Grand Jury look into the matters concerning the game law, the forest law, the motor vehicle law and closed schools, in order to recommend suggestions that could be tried in educating the people to respect these laws in a higher sense.

Byard Brewer, Burt's Corner, is appearing on his second offence, charged with being in care and control of a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, while Clark is being charged with operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor. Brewer's offence is alleged to have been committed in the city of Fredericton, and that of Clark in the Parish of Prince William. E. Allison MacKay appeared for the prosecution in Clark's case and Leo F. Cain for the defendant.

FISHERIES ACT VIOLATORS ARE SENTENCED

Spearing Salmon, Polluting of Water Among
Violations

Drifting Case Later

L. H. Parks, District Supervisor Announced
Conviction Today

L. H. Parks, District Supervisor of Dominion Fisheries reports to The Daily Mail five prosecutions in New Brunswick under the Dominion Fisheries Act during the month of September. Kenneth and Harvey Arbeau of Upper Blackville were found guilty of fishing salmon during the closed by the magistrate at Doaktown. John O'Neil and Guilford Watson of Cliforddale, Victoria County, were sentenced to \$10 and costs or 20 days in jail for spearing salmon. Information in this case was laid by J. T. Bell, the inspector of that section. Inspector Bell also laid information against George Wiggins of Four Falls for water pollution. He was brought before C. L. Olmstead of Perth, the Justice of the Peace, and was fined \$20 and costs.

On September 21st in the early hours of the morning Supervisor L. H. Park and Inspector E. G. Hunter were successful in catching two young men, Charles Colford, Jr., and Stanley Layton, of Howard, Northumberland County, in the act of drifting for salmon on the South West Miramichi at the mouth of Cains River. These two young men come up for trial at a later date.

Vaughan McLeod, Moncton, who pleaded guilty in the police court here last week to theft of a bicycle, was given a further remand of eight days yesterday.

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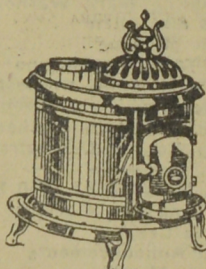
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Its light seemed white as snow,
