## ESCAPED YORK COUNTY JAIL PRISONER TAKEN

Ernest Hutcheson, colored prisoner, who escaped from the York county jail on Brunswick Street early Thursday morning, was captured by R. C. M. P. searchers last evening and is now safely lodged in the jail's dungeon. The 41-year-old prisoner, who self-confessedly escaped from the hospital for the criminally insane in Vancouver some months ago, was taken early last evening on the railway tracks between Cross Creek and McGivney Junction. It is likely that Hutcheson will face the charge of jail breaking along with that of attempting to break into a C. P. R. car between McAdam and Megantic some time ago. Picked up by the police last night, the man came quietly.

Police received word yesterday that Hutcheson had been seen proceeding toward Durham last night. One officer was sent on a railway speeder from McGivney to Cross Creek and back but there was no sign of the fugitive. Later, when the officer walked from McGivney toward Cross Creek keeping hidden in the bushes a short distance from the tracks. Hutcheson was seen slouching along.
