AMBITIOUS RADIO PROGRAM FROM MONTREAL

"A trip to the Orient" is one of the production numbers featured on the first part of the Radio Commission's "Babillage-Caprice" program which will originate in the Montreal studios tonight. Another production number has been written around "The Exquisite Hour" by Reynolds Hahn and featured on the same program will be two novelties: "La Vieille Guimbarde," one of the popular numbers in Paris today, and Reginald Forsythe's immensely popular "Serenade to a Wealthy Widow." This last number will be played in an xylophone-orchestra arrangement.

Dr. J. J. Gagnier's guest on the second half of the program will be Mme. Campbell, a Canadian mezzo-soprano recently returned from Paris. Mme. Campbell will sing from Rogers and Tschalkowsky and in addition will feature "Where'er you Walk" from Haendel's "Semele." The year 1935 marks the 250th anniversary of the death of Haendel and this event will be fittingly noted through interpretation of excerpts from this composer's "Water Music" by Dr. Gagnier and the Montreal Sinfonietta. Dr. Gagnier has also included music by Plerne, Simon, and Rossini in his program.

Norman Cordon Will Feature "Danny Deever"

Rudyard Kipling's dramatic ballad, "Danny Deever," set to music by Walter Damrosch, will be featured by Norman Cordon, Columbia's new baritone, with Howard Barlow and the Symphony Orchestra, in a program of concert classics to be broadcast over the nationwide WABC-Columbia network tonight from 10.00 to 10.30 P.M. AST.

Again illustrating his remarkable range of repertoire Cordon will offer Harry Burleigh's arrangement of a favorite Negro spiritual, "Nobody Knows de Trouble I seen," followed by the Rodgers melody, "With a Song in My Heart;" the "Pilgrim's Song" by Tschalkowsky and Amy Woodforde Fildes's "The Temple Bells." Cordon will close his program with another Rodgers' hit, "Isn't It Romantic?" Howard Barlow will direct the orchestra in the "Marche Militaire" from Tschalkowsky's "Nutcracker Suite;" two selections from Greig's Peer Gynt suite, Nos. 1 and 2, entitled "Arabian Dance" and "In the Hall of the Mountain King," closing the orchestral portion of the broadcast with selections from Kalman's opera, "The Five O'Clock Girl."
