SAW MARITIMES  
AT LOVELIEST  
SAYS BEATTY

MONTREAL, August 12—"We have seen the Maritimes at their loveliest and tourists from all parts of Canada and the United States are moving over that part of Canada in numbers that remind one of the more prosperous days," said Sir Edward Beatty on arrival here from St. Andrews by the Sea. Accompanied by a party of Canadian Pacific directors, Sir Edward had just completed an extensive tour covering the provinces of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, and all members of the party returned exceedingly well pleased with conditions they found there. "Maritime business," said Sir Edward, "is in the main, progressing very well. It naturally is affected by conditions existing in other parts of Canada, but while in the past they did not achieve that high point of business activity, they have this good fortune, that neither have they experienced the embarrassments that have troubled other parts of the country. "While prices have not been as high as one would wish, the movement of pulp, paper, export timber, fish and potatoes has been increasing, and with strengthening markets a very satisfactory position will be reached. Meanwhile, with the usual business astuteness traditional in the Maritimes, they have been able to keep costs in line so as to be in the fortunate position of having some net returns."

"During later weeks," said Sir Edward, "there has been a distinct increase in railway and motor travel from the United States and Western parts of Canada. While this larger number of tourists are not spending as freely as in more spacious days, still this is a tribute to the undoubted tourist attractions in the way of beautiful scenery, sunshine without oppressive heat and modern and pleasant tourist facilities. There is evident appreciation of the need for improved highway construction and much good work is going forward in all three provinces, particularly along the line of building hard-surfaced roads. In the Annapolis Valley the prospects are for an excellent crop of apples and the outlet for the export market is satisfactory."

The tour included visits to the capitals of the three provinces and inspection of Canadian Pacific facilities along the line. Those travelling with Sir Edward included Sir Charles Gordon, Ross H. McMaster, Morris W. Wilson, directors of Canadian Pacific, and Senator Smeaton White. H. J. Humphrey, vice-president and general manager of the C.P.R. Eastern Lines, accompanied the party throughout the tour.

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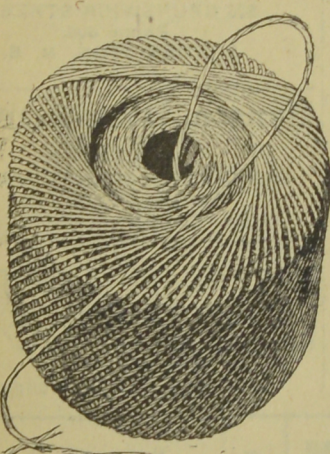
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
