Boys' Committee Met
to Discuss Gymnas-
tic Exhibition

Gym Classes Start

Practical Demonstration
Wed. on "Modern
Physical Education"

The Boys' Committee of the Y.M.C.A. met last evening to discuss the final plans for the gymnastic exhibition which is being presented to the public on Wednesday evening, Nov. 20 in the Brunswick street church gymnasium. W. K. Tibert, who is chairman of the Boys' Committee presided at last night's meeting. Others who were present were R. B. Vandine, Geo. W. Brown, Egbert Cass, Karl Walker, R. K. Nevers and Ralph J. Albrant.

Twenty-five of the leading gymnasts of the Saint John Y.M.C.A. are presenting next Wednesday's display for the local "Y" as a practical demonstration of "Modern Physical Education." A final draft of the program was checked over at the meeting last night. The program includes many novel features, among which are: Ruffy-Tuffy, a folk dance; a display on the flying rings; Electric club swinging; an exhibition of Tap Dancing; a Calisthenic Health Drill, a demonstration of Tumbling and Mat Work, Parallel Bar Gyrations, a Russian Dance; gymnastics on the side horse and others. A group of younger Fredericton boys will demonstrate briefly, a typical boys gym class, so parents and friends may see just what boys do when they go to the gym.

The committee decided last night not to charge an admission, as the sole purpose of the exhibition is to acquaint the citizens of Fredericton with what the Y.M.C.A. is doing in the field of Physical Education and inaugurate the starting of Y.M.C.A. gym classes for boys in this city. WILL DRAFT RESOLUTIONS FOR REFORM AT JAIL

Special Meeting of Ministerial Assoc. Respecting Improvements

Meet Next Thursday

Jail Farm and Segregation of Prisoners Urged at Meeting

At a special meeting of the Ministerial Association yesterday afternoon in the Brunswick Street Baptist Church Hall committees were appointed to draft and consider resolutions regarding improvements in the York County jail, it was announced by Rev. Dr. George E. Ross, secretary, following the meeting. The meeting was attended by several of the clergymen who had visited the jail last Friday in company with Councillor John Doherty and newspapermen and found such deplorable conditions. The whole movement for reform at the jail has been advocated by The Daily Mail from the start over a year ago. The committees drafting the resolutions will meet during the coming week to consider suggested reforms and then present their resolutions to the regular monthly meeting of the Ministerial Association next Thursday, Dr. Ross said. The whole association will then consider the resolutions before presenting them to the County Council at their next session in January and also to the Provincial Government. It is expected that the resolutions will advocate a jail farm and segregation of the prisoners to prevent first offence prisoners from having to mix with the hardened criminals. Proper exercise and diet will also be sought for the prisoners by the Association, it is said.

While it was agreed generally that a provincial jail farm was needed, for it was thought that probably other jails, beside that in York County are overcrowded, it was pointed out that steps should be taken to alleviate conditions as they exist in the local jail at the present time. Hence the two resolutions will be drafted. Establishment of a provincial jail farm is a matter to be dealt with by the provincial government, it was felt, while alleviation of overcrowded conditions in the county jail is a measure to be undertaken by the York County authorities.

In referring to a lack of exercise in the local jail, members of the association stressed the fact that many of the prisoners, even though they might be in jail for long terms, never move out of their cells. This was thought to be a demoralizing condition. The meagre diet provided the prisoners also was a subject for discussion.

A representative of The Daily Mail was informed yesterday by the Secretary of the Ministerial Association that the meeting was to be held in private in the same manner as the school board does its business. After the meeting, however, the president gave the proceedings away. It might be well for these gentlemen to get together. The president gave the resolutions to the press and the other members say that no resolutions have been presented and no one knows what they are.

The press which is endeavoring to co-operate with the social service organizations in this matter should be taken into their confidence. There is nothing to conceal.
