## Crosby and Mixed Chorus in Final Program of Series

Bing Crosby will blend his voice with a mixed chorus of twelve voices—a group featured with him in the new motion picture, "Big Broadcast of 1935"—in the final broadcast of his current series. The program will be heard over the nationwide WABC-Columbia network from 9:00 to 9:30 P. M., A. S. T. tonight.

The offering of Bing and the chorus will be "Wished On the Moon". Both Bing and the vocal organization sing it in the new film. In addition, Bing will present as solo numbers, accompanied by George Stoll's Orchestra, "In a Little Gypsy Tea Room", "When a Gypsy Makes His Violin Cry", "Lou Saved My Life" and "Seeing Is Believing".

The "Big Broadcast of 1935" is a sequel to the "Big Broadcast", in which many of the radio favorites of 1932 were starred. Bing himself made a hit in the original picture. Others who were featured in it were Kate Smith, the Mills Brothers, Burns and Allen, and Cab Calloway. In the sequel Ethel Merman is a co-star with Bing.

## Lucy Monroe to co-star With Munn In Popular Series

Lucy Monroe, lyric soprano of grand opera, the musical stage and radio, will join the musical cast of "Lavender and Old Lace" as a co-star with Frank Munn the popular tenor on the WABC-Columbia network tonight, from 8:00 to 8:30 P. M., A. S. T. She will be heard in the weekly feature thereafter in the role formerly filled by Bernice Claire, coloratura soprano, who will sail for England June 7, to star in a musical film.

Supported by Gustav Haenschel's orchestra, Miss Monroe and Munn will be heard in duet and solo versions of old ballads and favorite songs of yesteryear.

Miss Monroe, a native of New York, is a daughter of Anna Laughlin, favorite of the Broadway musical comedy stage of a quarter of a century ago. Lucy has played the prima donna roles in the Broadway productions of "The First Little Show" and "The O'Flynn" the latter a swashbuckling Irish operetta which was presented as a serial over the WABC-Columbia network several months ago. In 1934, she appeared in star roles in productions of the Chicago Opera Company.

## Shaw and Chesterton Broadcast Dates Are Switched on Schedule

Gilbert K. Chesterton and George Bernard Shaw, two of England's greatest contemporary men of letters, will be heard over the coast-to-coast WABC-Columbia network on June 11 and June 18, respectively, from 5:00 to 5:20 P. M., A. S. T. These dates supersede the original announcement, Shaw having been originally scheduled to speak on June 1 and Chesterton on June 18.

Both of the 20-minute talks were arranged by the British Broadcasting Corporation as features of their "Freedom" series and will originate in the BBC studios in London. The talks have been relayed to the Columbia Broadcasting System audience each week during the past two months.

Shaw's broadcast on June 18 will mark one of the few times the caustic British playwright and author has been on the air. Several years ago he was heard by CBS listeners in an international broadcast from London and elicited much editorial comment when he addressed the American public as "Dear Old Boobs!"

The Shaw talk will conclude the present series of "Freedom" programs. Other noted speakers included Sir Ernest Benn, Herbert Morrison and Wyndham Lewis.

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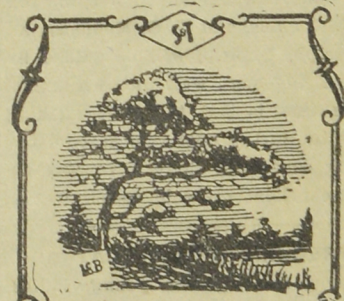
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
